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Farm - City Week Planned

RALEIGH — Rural and urban people from all over the Tar Heel state are invited to participate in the National Farm-City Week observance, Nov. 18-24.

According to Wade Hendricks, director of farm and public relations for Northwest Bank, Statesville, and chairman of the event, Farm-City Week has a special goal — to build a better understanding between urban and rural neighbors.

During that week townspeople learn what their farm neighbors

are doing to produce better, and more abundant food at low cost. They learn the importance of an efficient agriculture in the national economy. They also learn about the importance of farm families as consumers of all kinds of consumer and production goods.

On the other hand, farm families become better acquainted with the people who buy their food and fiber. They get a better understanding of the town folks' view on local government,

planning and development. They come to see that the proper and orderly growth of a community depends on the joint efforts of all people.

This understanding comes about by meeting together. Here in North Carolina, each county plans its own Farm-City Week program, although there will be a kick-off luncheon at the North Carolina State Faculty Club, Nov. 18. Guest speaker will be Chancellor John T. Caldwell, North Carolina State University.

Answer Service Was Originated Of Necessity

At first only Doctor Jones was using it. Then Senator Smith went over, followed by Attorney Brown. Now Businessman Nelson and Actress Stella have joined the crowd.

That's the 40-year success story of telephone answering service. It was born of necessity from doctors' emergencies. When dial switching began to replace local telephone operators, physicians needed someone to handle calls from patients 24 hours a day. Answering bureaus solved their problem. The bureaus were connected to doctors' phone lines in the telephone company central office, and they answered calls when the doctor couldn't.

Today there are 3,500 answering bureaus in Bell System territory, serving 504,000 clients, said R. B. Moore, local telephone manager.
