Following tions from mists in the United States Department of Agriculture on the selection and prepa-ration of pork: The meat of high-quality pork shoul have firm, fine-texture lean, grayish-pink in color with firm white fat on the outside of the cut. Some fat should be well-distributed through the lean. Be sure through the lean. Be sure your fresh pork is thoroughly cooked. A meat thermometer is helpful in providing a reliable method of testing thoroughness of cooking pork roasts. When done, a fresh pork roast should have an internal temperature of 185 degrees, while a cured ham—whole or half—should —whole or half—should reach 160 degrees. For a cured picnic shoulder, 170 degrees is desirable.
