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



It will cost out-of-district pupils \$60 to attend Kings Mountain schools this term, but the condition of acceptance is that they have obtained release from their

particular board of jurisdiction. This action still leaves an estimated 30 East Kings Mountain students in left field, unless they can obtain extension of a Superior Court order to attend Kings Mountain schools where they have attended all their school
