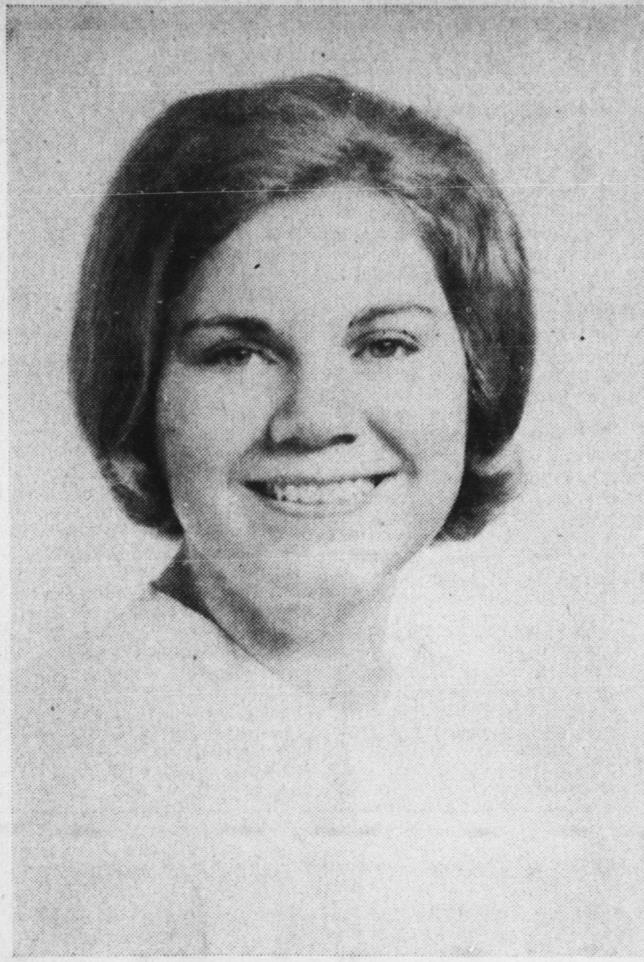




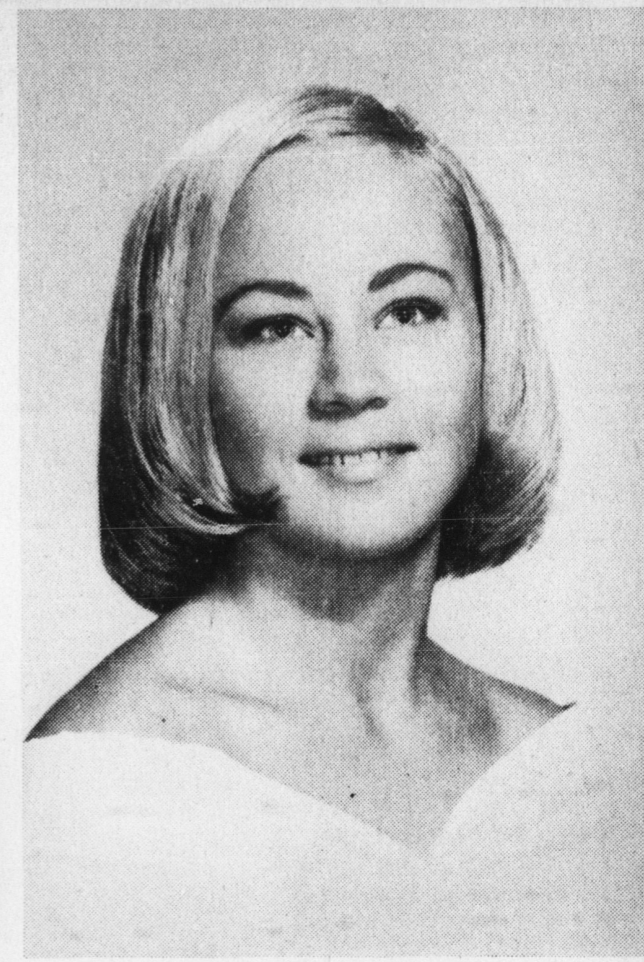

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Household Hints

You can fill small nail holes in white plaster walls with a paste made from white kitchen cleanser and white shoe polish. When your car's windshield gets covered with bugs, try scrubbing them off with a piece of crumpled nylon net. If a recipe calls for 1 1/4 cups uncooked hominy grits, the equivalent is about a half a pound. If power fails, keep your freezer door tightly closed. A half-full freezer will maintain 0 degrees F. for approximately 20 to 24 hours. Good quality all-weather coats will have linings that hang straight and loose at the bottom, and will come with extra buttons. Read and follow the manufacturer's instructions when you use laundry products. Don't dump and guess. Scrub the undersides of scatter rugs occasionally with heavy suds to remove dust and wax. Only clean backing can grip the floor securely.

Wintry Scene Combines Popcorn Snow-Laden Trees

An enchanting idea for a table or mantle decoration at a child's party, or just a fun thing to make on a cold winter's day is a lollipop pond nestled in popcorn snow. Add a tiny skier, snow laden trees and falling snow and the wintry scene is complete.

POPCORN WINTER SCENE LOLLIPOP POND

- 1/4 cup corn oil
1/2 cup popcorn
1/2 cup light corn syrup
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
Prepare lollipop pond (recipe below). Heat corn oil in a 4-quart kettle over medium heat for 3 minutes. Add popcorn. Cover, leaving small air space at edge of cover. Shake frequently over medium heat until popping stops. Meanwhile mix together corn syrup, sugar and salt. Add to popped corn in kettle and stir over medium heat 3 to 5 minutes or until corn is evenly and completely coated with mixture. Remove from heat. Make some of the mixture into balls of different sizes. Leave some plain. If necessary, make up recipe twice but do not use of popcorn to hang above scene for falling snow. Shape some into trees.

TO SET UP WINTER SCENE:

Take a large carton turned on the side with opening at front, stage fashion. Cover bottom of scene with cotton batting or white tissue paper. Cover with waxed paper or plastic wrap. Remove candy with foil from cookie sheet and folk back or cut off the extra foil. Place pond at one side of scene. Behind pond, place artificial trees or trees made of popped corn. In opposite corner of scene build up a popcorn-ball hill. Fill in around scene with pieces of dry popcorn. Break small pieces of reserved lollipop candy into bits and scatter this candy ice around pond edges. Place a small doll dressed in winter togs in the scene. Hang popcorn snow from carton above the scene.

LOLLIPOP POND

- 2 cups sugar
1 cup light corn syrup
1/2 cup water
1 1/2 teaspoons essence of peppermint
Mix sugar, corn syrup and water in a saucepan. Cook over medium heat stirring constantly until sugar is dissolved. Continue cooking without stirring to 300 degrees F. or until a small amount of mixture separates into threads which are hard and brittle when tested in very cold water. Cool slightly. Add flavoring; blend. Pour about 1/2 cup of candy onto small greased dish or a piece of foil. Pour remainder of candy into center of a piece of ungreased foil placed on a cookie sheet, letting candy spread naturally. Let candy harden.
