The Veterans Corner

Q—I have just reinstated my Government Life Insurance policy and don't want it to lapse again. How may I use my dividends to keep my insurance from lapsing?

A—You have two options, your credit option and your premium option. If you choose to use your credit option, notify VA before your next dividend is due and ask them to hold your dividend as a credit against a lapse of premium payment. The VA will hold your dividend to your credit, paying interest until it is used. Then, if your premium is not paid at the end of the 31-day grace period, enough money will be withdrawn from your credit to pay your premium. If you ask the VA to exercise your premium option, your dividend will be converted to pay your premiums in advance as far as possible. You will be billed for premiums again at least one month in advance of your next premium due date.

Q—I am currently receiving pension under the so-called "old law." Can I change to the new law, and some time in the future go back to the old law if my income is reduced below the \$2,700 or \$1,400 limits?

A—No. While you may change to the new pension law (PL 86-211) you cannot revert to the old pension law again at a later date.

Q—As I understand it, G. I. life insurance has four options available under which the proceeds may be paid upon the death of the insured. Option one is a lump sum payment. Does this mean that the beneficiary must really take the proceeds in a lump sum?

A—No. This option makes the lump sum available if the beneficiary desires it. Primarily, it makes the proceeds entirely flexible for the beneficiary who may choose to take the entire amount in a lump sum and the balance in monthly installments, or takes the entire amount in monthly installments. If the insured makes option one available to the beneficiary, all four options—including life annuities—become available to the beneficiary at the time of the policyholders death.
