

### A Total Of 16 Injured In Three Auto Accidents

According to the Kings Mountain Police Department a total of 16 persons were injured during the past week in traffic accidents in Kings Mountain. Property damage totaled \$2750 including a 1968 Volkswagen that just had 27 miles on the speedometer hand. Damage to that vehicle was estimated at \$1200.

Sunday, April 21, a car driven by Robert Parrish, 22, Shelby, was struck by a car driven by Gloria Falls, 20, of 600 Phenix Street, Kings Mountain.

The Parrish car was traveling in a funeral procession on Kings Street, accident occurred in front of City Esso, Falls stated that she did not see the car traveling in the funeral procession and that she took the green light. Nine persons were injured in the accident with Parrish, the driver of one vehicle, being admitted to the Kings Mountain Hospital with cuts and bruises. Parrish was thrown from the vehicle. Other injuries included: Charles, Kenneth, James, and Jaramia Lee. Ivey Nolan, Mammie Roper, L. E. and Dennis Falls.

On impact, the cars traveled through the gas pumps of City Esso causing a fire to start. Damage to the property, owned by Jis Falls Sr. has not been estimated.

In another accident, Sunday, a car driven by Steve Arnold Murray, 19, of 127 Elm Street, Kings Mountain rammed into the rear of a vehicle driven by Howard Bennett, 39, McGinnis Street, Kings Mountain.

Three persons were injured in the two car accident. Eddie Black was treated for cuts and bruises and then released from the Kings Mountain Hospital. Kathy and Robin Bennett, passengers in the Bennett car, were treated for bruises and then released. L. D. Beattie was the investigating officer.

In the final accident of the week, and perhaps the most expensive, involved a 1968 Volkswagen which only had 27 total miles on it. Gall Turner was driver of the car, which was struck by J. C. Lynn, 49, Oriental

Avenue, Kings Mountain. Damage totaled \$1200 to the Turner car. The damage to the Lynn car was estimated to be \$325. Four persons were injured in the accident which occurred at the intersection of Ridge and Cleveland. Injured were: Diane Lutz, Johnny Turner, Debbie Brown, along with Turner, 17, the driver.

#### WINS SCHOLARSHIP

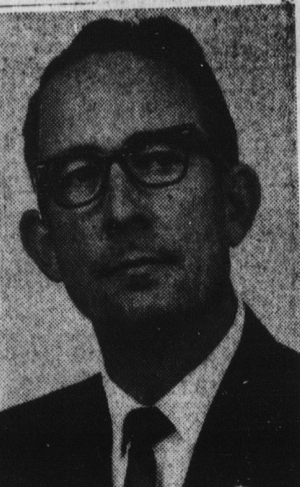
