Col. Ratterree Is Retired

Lt. Col. James G. Ratterree, 411 West Mountain St., retired today after 25 years of active Air Force service. For the past two years he was the commander of the 3rd District Office of Special Investigations (OSI) at Olmsted State Airport, Middletown, Pa.

He was awarded the second oak leaf cluster to his Air Force Commendation Medal during a special retirement ceremony in his office.

Colonel Ratterree entered the Air Force in 1942 as an aviation cadet, and during World War II flew 52 combat missions as a B-25 bomber pilot in the Southwest Pacific, winning the Distinguished Flying Cross. He was awarded the Purple Heart for wounds received while flying a mission over Salama in New Guinea in 1943.

During his career he served other overseas assignments at Goose Bay, Labrador; England and Germany. Prior to coming to Olmsted in 1966 he was the assistant deputy director of Special Investigations in Europe for three years. Colonel Ratterree is a graduate of Kings Mountain High School and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill with a degree in commerce. He is married to the former Gladys Guffey. The Ratterrees have a daughter Julia and a son, Scott.
