

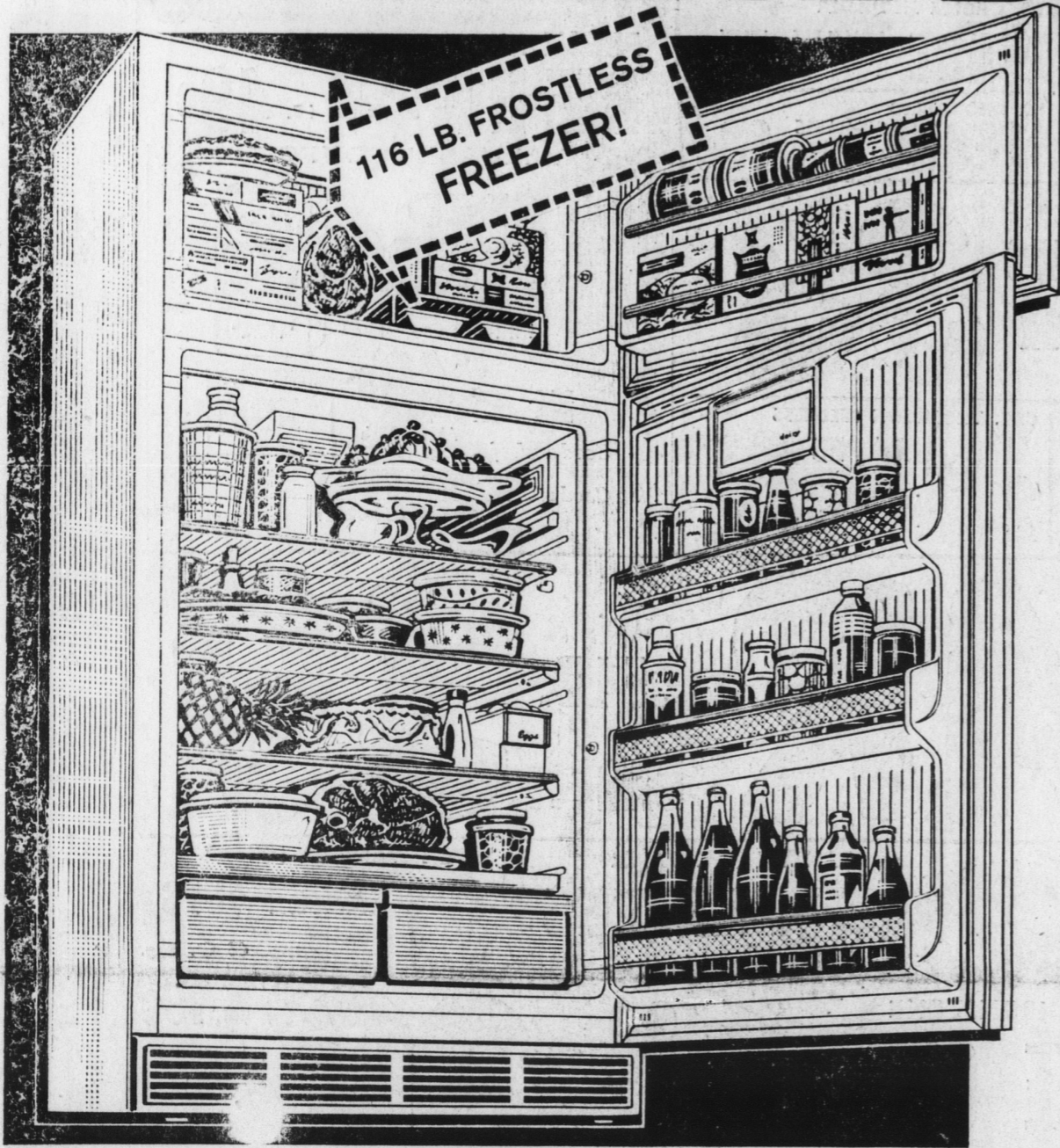

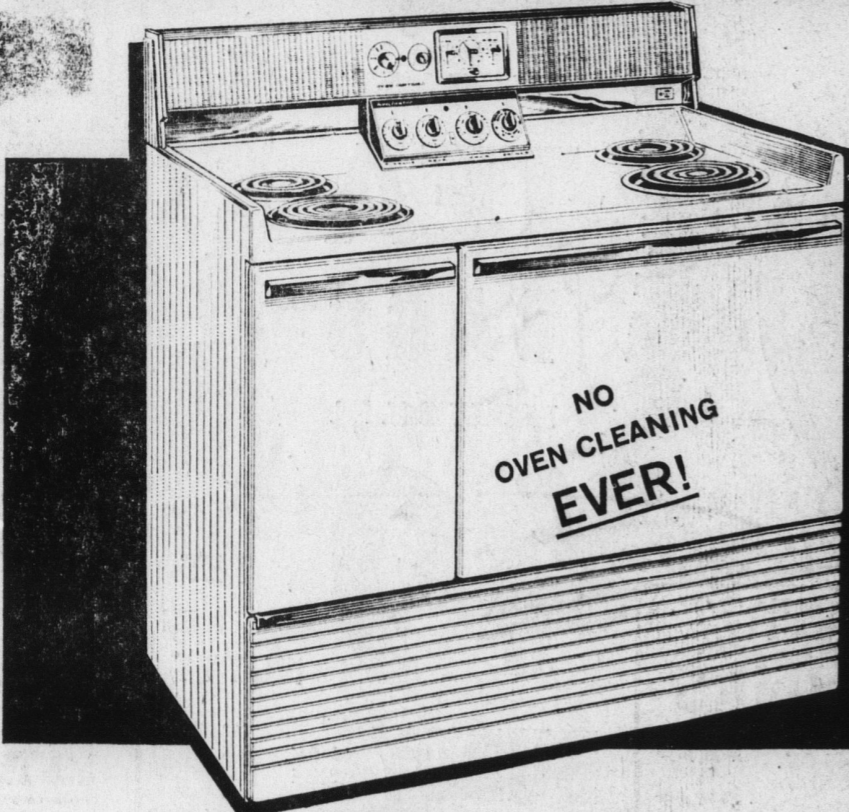

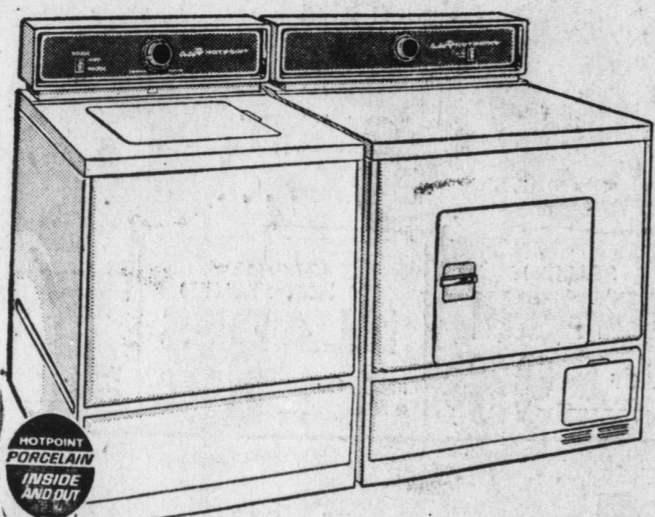

### Rep. Broyhill In Shelby

Representative James T. Broyhill visited Cleveland County Tuesday. He visited local industries and talked to the residents of Cleveland County throughout the day.

A coffee was given at the home of Mrs. Ronald Keiger of Shelby, followed by a cake party at 3:30 in the home of Mrs. George Bryant, also of Shelby.

Congressman Broyhill spoke at the Civitan Club meeting at 12:15. He commented on the principal differences in this congress and the preceding congress. The following is a copy of his speech at that meeting.

"The difference in the moods of the two Congresses clearly comes from popular demands that we stop the headlong rush into vast new spending and the greater management of the lives of the American people by the bureaucracy in Washington.

Actually, a good deal more than a restraining hand from the people is being felt in Washington. There is a strong undercurrent of frustration, resentment, and even anger in America today. The 'old' formulas that call for the federal government to assume all obligations and leave everything to Washington is not working.

The people too are increasingly distressed by the assertion of power by the Supreme Court and it is likely that we are entering a national dialogue now that will reassess the authority of the court.

No matter what else may be said about the nomination of Mr. Fortas as the new Chief Justice of the court, the American people understand that the real argument revolves around the philosophy of Mr. Fortas.

Very frankly, I feel that appointments of this kind must be viewed differently than those, let us say, for the President's cabinet. Within reason, I feel, that presidents should be allowed to choose top administrators who will carry out their programs while they are in the presidency. However, Supreme Court and other judicial appointments with their lifetime tenure of office is something else.

Although the House of Representatives will not have any authority in confirming or rejecting the nomination of Mr. Fortas, I feel the Senate should have a full debate about his appointment. This will provide a full dress debate about the Supreme Court itself. Although what is said in this discussion may be drowned out by the noise of the presidential campaign, the dialogue deserves careful attention. There is no doubt that the decision of the Senate will have a great influence on the direction of the country for years to come."

Wednesday, the congressman was honored at a cake party in the home of Mrs. Harold Hornon, visited the residents of Bolling Springs, and attended a precinct meeting in Patterson Springs.

### Census Survey On Smoking

Census Bureau interviewers will conduct a survey here concerning the smoking habits of the population during the week of August 19, Director Joseph R. Norwood of the Census Regional Office in Charlotte announced. Interviewers will ask about people's past smoking habits as well as present habits in order to discover whether there have been significant changes over the past year.

Interviews conducted locally are part of the third annual survey of smoking habits taken among a representative sample of the nation's population to provide statistical data for the U. S. Public Health Service.

The questions on smoking will be asked during the Bureau's monthly labor force inquiries. Questions about jobs are designed to provide data for use by the U. S. Department of Labor in determining current national employment and unemployment trends.

The identity of households in the survey throughout the U. S. is confidential, and the information obtained will be used only for statistical purposes.
