The new Mrs. Tongret is a graduate of Kings Mountain High School and had entered her junior year at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

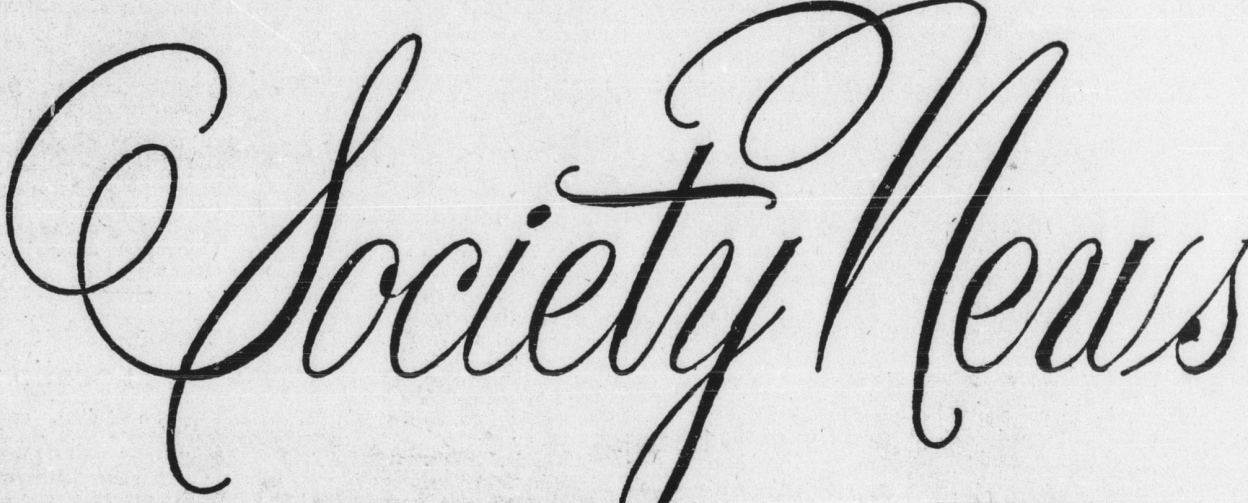
