STRETCH CLOTHING BUDGET

With the cost of both men's and women's clothing going up, several Yadkin County homemakers decided to stretch their clothing budgets by learning to tailor coats and suits.

One homemaker, Mrs. F. J. Myers is making her husband a jacket. Another homemaker, Mrs. William Davis is making a boy's coat for one of her eight children.

Elaine Johnson, assistant home economics Extension agent, said several women have already enthusiastically started a second garment.

The women feel the time they spend on tailoring is time well spent and will mean a definite savings in family clothing costs, the agent added.

SNUG REFRIGERATOR DOOR

Does your refrigerator door fit snugly? Here's an easy way to check it. Close the door on a slip of paper. If the paper can be easily pulled out while the door is closed, the rubber gasket should be replaced to keep out warm air.

Wash the rubber gasket each week, advises Mrs. Sandra C. Brown, home economics Extension agent, Washington County. Fruit juices or grease can break it down.

SAVE TIME AND ENERGY

If you have small children around the house, some household jobs will be left undone now and then.

However, a group of young mothers enrolled in an Educational Improvement course in meal preparation, under the direction of Mrs. Mary J. Whitmore, assistant home economics Extension agent, Durham County, learned that the lagging task does not have to be that of meal preparation.

Participants of the program admitted they had given little thought to such management techniques as storing leftovers in a dish or wrap that could be used for reheating. Nor had they considered making ample use of low-cost convenience foods, so that preparation and clean-up time could be reduced.

"After all," Mrs. Sylvia Crisp, one of the participants observed, "busy young homemakers can use the energy they save in food preparation for other homemaking jobs."

GROW YOUR OWN

Agencies in Moore County are working together to encourage low-income families to plant a

garden with at least five vegetables.

According to Mrs. Amelia S. Capehart, home economics Extension agent, a project has been initiated whereby a garden plot will be soil-tested, plowed up, limed and fertilized if the family consents to buy seeds and plants and set them out and cultivate them to maturity.

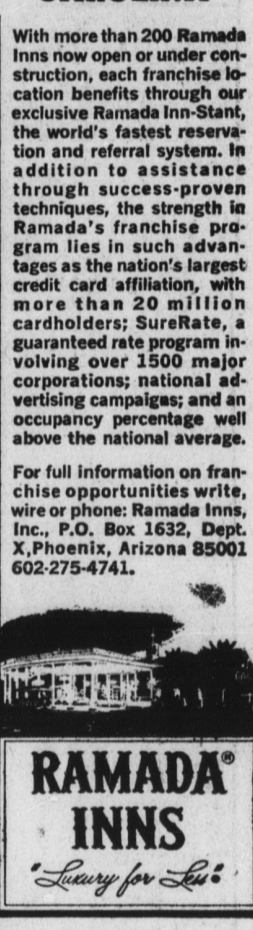
Agency representatives are now busy locating low-income families who are interested in growing vegetables to eat fresh and to conserve for later use.
