A firm wants to provide bus service for school children who do not qualify for regular school bus service.

George B. Thomasson, Kings Mountain attorney, will appear before the city board of commissioners at Tuesday's regular meeting to outline a plan of Beam & Brooks and Bobby Creighton to provide this service.

Under North Carolina law, school children must reside at least 1.5 mile from the school they attend to qualify for state provided bus transportation.

Bak, meaning foot fighting, was people. This was a method of self-defense in Korea as old as the nation itself. The people had a high regard for So oBak and through the inspiration of the Hwa Rang Dan warriors began to train themselves and develop their art. So Bak was combined with the Hwa Rang Dan principles to become Soo Bak Do and formed the traditional martial art of Korea. In time, Soo Bak Do absorbed the more effective and finer aspects of the other existing martial arts, and merged as Tang Soo Do.
