The KINGS MOUNTAIN HOUSING AUTHORITY, Kings Mountain, North Carolina, will receive bids for the furnishing of all labor, equipment and services required to construct Low Rent Housing Project N. C. 64-1, Kings Mountain, North Carolina, at the Court Room in Kings Mountain City Hall, 112 Piedmont Avenue, Kings Mountain, North Carolina (ZIP 28086). Proposals will be received until 2:00 P.M. (local standard time) on 6 June, 1969, at which time and place, all proposals received will be publicly opened and read aloud.

Four separate bids will be received for General Construction; Plumbing, Heating and Air Conditioning; and for Interior Electrical Work and Electric Distribution.

Project N. C. 64-1, Kings Mountain, consists of 50 dwelling buildings containing 150 dwelling units, a separate Administration, Maintenance Building, and other improvements to include utilities, site improvements and landscape work.

Proposed forms of contract documents, including plans and specifications, are on file in the office of the local housing authority and at the office of the Architect, TOMBERLIN ASSOCIATES, ARCHITECTS, INC., 2099 Monroe Drive, N. E., Atlanta, Georgia 30324, telephone (404) 875-4521.

Copies of the documents may be obtained by depositing Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) with the Architect for each set of documents so desired. Two (2) sets of plans and specifications will be issued to bona fide Prime Contractors for deposit. All sub-contractors and material suppliers who desire plans and specifications must pay the cost of reproduction which will be deducted from the above stated deposit amount and refunded to the depositor after the bids are received. Full deposits from Prime Contractors will be refunded on up to two sets of plans and specifications if returned within 10 days after the bid opening. Cost of reproduction will be charged for sets in excess of two requested by Prime Contractors.

A certified check or bank draft, payable to the Kings Mountain Housing Authority, U. S. Government bonds, or a satisfactory bid bond executed by the bidder and acceptable sureties in an amount equal to five percent (5%) of the bid shall be submitted with each bid. The successful bidder will be required to furnish and pay for satisfactory performance and payment bond or bonds.

Attention is called to the fact that not less than the minimum salaries and wages as set forth in the specifications must be paid on this project.

The Kings Mountain Housing Authority reserves the right to reject any or all bids and to waive any informalities in the bidding. No bids may be withdrawn for a period of thirty (30) days subsequent to the opening of bids without the consent of the Kings Mountain Housing Authority.

What's In A Name? Smith Most Popular Among N. C. Veterans

What's in a name? Plenty — especially if your name is Smith. According to the Veterans Administration, Smith is the most popular (310,000) among veterans in the VA's master index file of names.

And, if you are John Smith, W. R. Phillips, Manager of the North Carolina VA Regional Office, reports that you are one of 13,130 in its file.

The Johnsons (202,700) not only are keeping up with the Joneses but are far out in front. In fact, even the Williamses — with 150,020 — are ahead of the fourth-place Joneses, who number 145,180. In fifth place are the Browns with 144,000.

Phillips points out that with more than 31 million names in its master index even somewhat unusual names may be duplicated many times.

While there are only 10 veterans with the name Abraham

Lincoln, the VA file contains 1,640 Robert E. Lees. There are 44 Ulysses S. Grants and 496 George Washingtons.

With more than 95 million pieces of mail being received a year, the VA needs positive identifying information in inquiries from veterans and dependents

always to include the veteran's full name and file number.

Every veteran who has ever applied for a VA benefit of any kind has such a file number; but if the number is not known, or if writing about an insurance question, the veterans should include his insurance number.

If the veteran has neither a VA file or insurance number, in his letter he should include his date of birth, social security number, branch of military service, dates of service and military service number.

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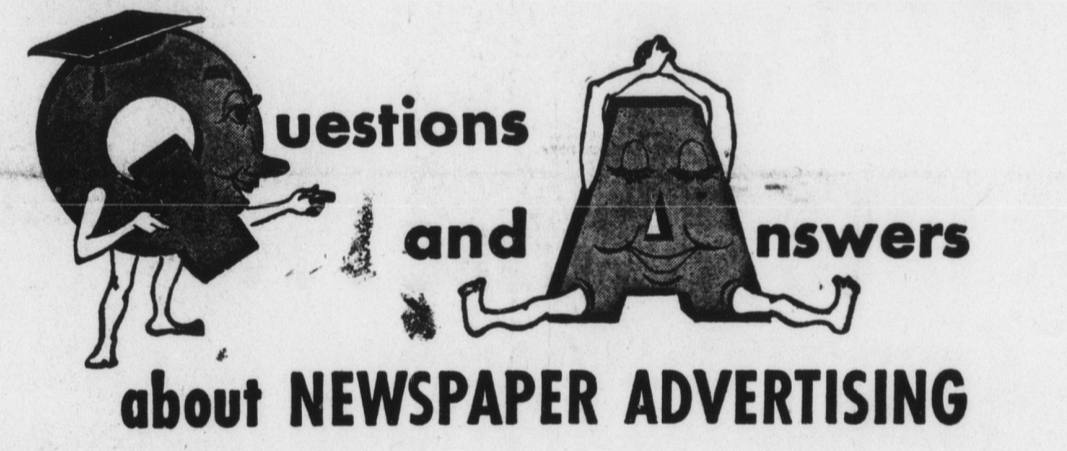
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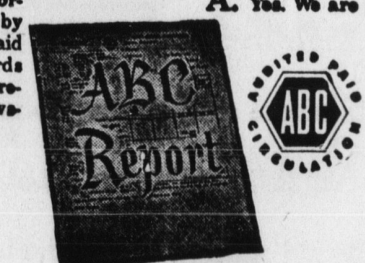

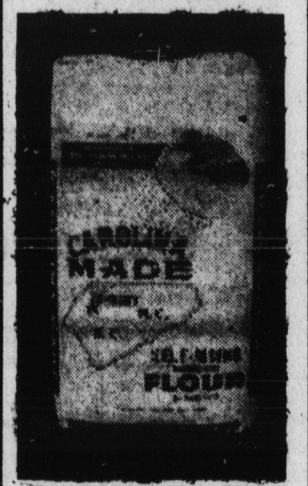
MEMO TO ADVERTISERS
