- BLUEBERRY CREAM CHEESE PIE**
- 1 1/2 cups fresh blueberries
 - 12 ounces packaged cream cheese
 - 1 tablespoon flour
 - 3 egg yolks
 - 1 egg white
 - 3 tablespoons sugar
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 3/4 cup sour cream
 - 1 unbaked pie crust shell (8 inch)
- Rinse fresh blueberries in colander and let drain thoroughly or dry on paper towels. Using fork, stir softened cream cheese until smooth. Add flour and mix thoroughly. Lightly beat egg yolks with one egg white; add sugar, salt and sour cream. Brush unbaked pie shell lightly with leftover egg white. Dust blueberries lightly with flour and place in thick layer on bottom of crust. Smooth cream cheese mixture evenly over blueberries and bake in preheated moderate oven (350 F.) for 30 minutes or until set. For extra goodness, serve with a tall glass of cold milk.

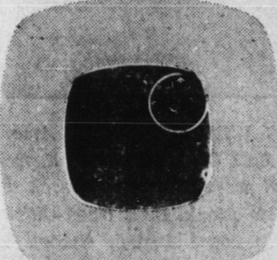
Everyone manages to stay busy around the Roberts home. Mary
