Ninety-Six Young Women Are Formally Presented At Debutante Ball Saturday

Telephone Talk

THE NATIONAL SAFETY COUNCIL VACATION HINTS:

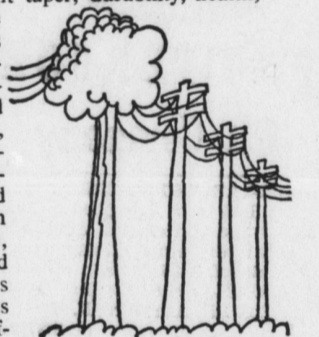
Get your car in tip-top shape. Check tires and brakes, lights and wipers, steering system.

Pack only the props you'll need. Luggage piled high in the back seat is a scene stealer and can block visibility to the rear. If necessary, use a luggage carrier.

Don't forget flashlight, flares, first-aid kit—and pack 'em so you can get to them in a hurry.

Plan your itinerary for reasonable mileage in one day. It's a good idea to phone ahead for overnight bookings so you don't keep pounding the road looking for a "vacancy" sign.

TO BECOME A TELEPHONE POLE, a tree has to be something special. If it looks promising, it's checked for height, slight taper, durability, health, and posture. And, for the tree that can pass this exacting physical examination, that's only the beginning. After cutting and trimming, it's washed, shaved, bored for climbing steps, cut to the proper length, inspected and seasoned in the sun. Then preservative is added, and it's dried and checked again. A tree that has gone through all this is good for about a half-century of service as a telephone pole. Which is a pretty impressive career, any way you look at it.
