Gastonia Woman Doctor Dorothy Glenn Joins Marine Son For Duty In Vietnam

SAIGON — It took Dr. Dorothy Glenn, an obstetrician-gynecologist, 25 years to build her medical practice in Gastonia, N. C. In October 1967, Dr. Glenn made her last medical rounds in that city. She delivered her last baby, treated her final patient, packed her black medical bag—and went to Vietnam.

The then 55-year-old physician gave up her comfortable medical practice in Gastonia to join the U. S. Agency for International Development (AID) in Saigon "to serve my country and to help the sick and wounded there."

She is one of more than 325 American women working in AID's pacification program in Vietnam. As a medical advisor to the Ministry of Health on maternity and child health, clinical medicine, and hospital planning programs, Dr. Glenn has helped establish hundreds of maternal and child health clinics throughout Vietnam. Since her arrival,

the South Vietnamese people — with AID assistance — have constructed six new hospitals and completed major improvements in the 61 existing hospitals.

Dr. Glenn says the Vietnamese have emphasized medical training and points out that last year 187 new doctors received medical degrees as compared to 85 in 1965.

More than 250 pharmacists, 600 nurses and 300 midwives also were trained in 1968. Dr. Glenn says that the number of Vietnamese being cared for by the country's medical system has increased substantially. For example, she explains, in early 1966 civilian hospitals were treating less than 150,000 out-patients and in-patients monthly. By the end of 1968, the monthly average reached nearly 300,000.

Dr. Glenn often visits maternal and child health clinics in remote hamlets and villages where the Viet Cong sneak in at night and disappear during the day when allied forces secure the area.

One of the fighting men securing the countryside is Dr. Glenn's son, marine Lt. John L. Glenn. He flies a light military observation plane in the northern section of South Vietnam looking for enemy troop movements on the ground.

In different ways Lt. Glenn and his mother are working towards the same goal—to help the Vietnamese people to develop and build the kind of nation they want to live in without being dominated by other nations, an AID official said.

On rare occasions when Dr. Glenn and her son meet in Vietnam they visit the market place and buy fresh fish, meat, fruits, and vegetables. Then Dr. Glenn, who is "a very good cook" according to husband Dr. Charles A. Glenn of Gastonia, whips up a home-cooked meal for her marine son John.

Dr. Charles Glenn is a prominent North Carolina surgeon. In commenting about his wife's service in Vietnam Dr. Charles Glenn said, "Dorothy is very patriotic and she is doing something good for her country. She volunteered for Vietnam. So did my son John. In his senior year in college in 1965 he joined the Marine Corps as a private. Later he went to Officer Candidates School in
