AN ORDINANCE TO EXTEND THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF KINGS MOUNTAIN, NORTH CAROLINA.

Whereas, the Board of Commissioners has been petitioned under G.S. 160-452, as amended, to annex the area described herein, and

Whereas, the City Clerk has certified the sufficiency of said petition and a public hearing on the question of this annexation was held at Council Chambers at 6:30 p.m. on the 26th day of August, 1969, after due notice published on the 7th day of August, 1969, and

Whereas, the Board of Commissioners, does hereby find a public hearing was held on the 26th day of August, 1969, at 6:30 p.m., and

Whereas, the Board of Commissioners, does hereby find that the territory described by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Kings Mountain, North Carolina: 1. By virtue of the authority granted by G.S. 160-452, and the following description of territory is hereby annexed to the City of Kings Mountain as of the 26th day of August, 1969.

Beginning at a poplar tree, corner and runs S. 49 degrees, 12 minutes, E. 912 feet to a stake of road, Bennett, George Phifer's corner; thence S. 43 degrees, 14 minutes, W. 149 feet to Bennett, Phifer and Phifer's corner in center of creek; thence with said creek, S. 30 degrees, 30 minutes, W. 676 feet to a stake in center of Beath Creek; thence with another stake in said creek N. 7 degrees, 16 minutes, E. 160 feet to a stake in center of creek, a new corner in Phifer's line; thence S. 37 degrees, 14 minutes, E. 553 feet to the line of NG, containing 10.06 acres or less, and being a portion of the land conveyed to W. B. Phifer and George M. Phifer and which is recorded in the Deeds Office of the County of Deeds Office for Kings Mountain, North Carolina.

Section 2. Upon and after the 1st day of January, 1970, the aforesaid territory and its contents and property shall be subject to all debts, laws, ordinances and regulations in force in the City of Kings Mountain and shall be entitled to the same privileges and benefits as other parts of the City of Kings Mountain.

Section 3. The Mayor of the City of Kings Mountain shall cause to be recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds of Cleveland County, and in the office of the Secretary of State of Raleigh, North Carolina, an accurate map of the annexed territory, describing the territory in accordance with section 1 hereof, together with a duly certified copy of this ordinance.

Section 4. This ordinance shall become effective once, following the effective date of annexation, in a newspaper having general circulation in the City of Kings Mountain.
