November Is Month Of Firsts For Bell System

Historically, November is a month of "firsts" in the Bell System... beginning many important activities in both operations and equipment use.

A. T. & T. first offered private line service in November, 1886, and on November 1, 1887, the first differentiation between day and night long distance rates came into effect, with night rates lower in most instances.

In November, 1931, A. T. & T. inaugurated TWX, a teletypewriter exchange service. Twenty-one years later in November, a trans-continental coaxial cable from Atlanta to Los Angeles was completed.

The trial of long distance customer dialing began in November, 1951, as Englewood, New Jersey's May Denning dialed the first call to Mayor Osborne at Alameda, California.

In November, 1956, overseas service was extended to Saudi Arabia and Jordan, and four years later long lines announced plans for a specially designed ship to lay oceanic telephone cables (C. S. Long Lines).

Henry W. Pope, a one time traffic manager for Southern Bell, organized the Telephone Pioneers of America at the Hotel Somerset in Boston, Mass., November 2, 1911. Alexander Graham Bell and 246 other telephone people attended this first meeting.

In November, 1920, radio station KDKA in Pittsburgh began broadcasting programs, and four years later the first broadcast of presidential election returns as Calvin Coolidge defeated John W. Davis.

Dr. Clinton J. Davison of Bell Telephone Laboratories became the first Bell System man to win the Nobel Prize when he shared the award in November, 1937, with Professor George P. Thomson of London. Dr. Davison won the award for his experimental discovery of the wave nature of an electron.

In November, 1950, the Bell System passed the \$10 billion mark, and in November, 1953, the 50,000,000 telephone was installed on President Dwight D. Eisenhower's desk. Today, that figure has more than doubled, and there are 63.1 telephones per 100 people in the U. S., said R. B. Moore, telephone manager.

Yam Variety Higher Yields

Higher yields and improved quality are two of the important potentials of a new sweet potato variety recently released by North Carolina State University.

The Jewel variety — also known as N. C. 240 — has produced slightly higher yields than Centennial and Nugget, according to Dr. Daniel T. Pope, who developed the new potato.

Foundation seed will be available in 1970 to certified seed growers for seed increase.

Jewel was tested for yield for three years under a wide range of growing conditions. In 1966, the yield of total marketable potatoes was 532 bushels per acre compared to 420 for Centennial; 595 bushels in 1967 compared to 536 for Centennial; and 594 bushels in 1968 compared to 524 for Centennial.

In five tests for comparison with the Gem variety in 1968, Jewel produced an average of 609 bushels per acre to Gem's 576.

The average of 19 tests each in 1967 and 1968 in the National Sweet Potato Cooperators Group Testing Program was 423 bushels per acre for the first year and 466 bushels the following year.

Jewel, in addition to being a potentially high yielding variety, is described as more attractive in appearance than its two parent lines, Centennial and Nugget.

The skin color of N. C. 240 is a deeper copper color with less russeting than Centennial, the most widely grown commercial variety in the U. S. The flesh is a uniform orange intermediate color between Centennial and Nugget.

The roots of the new variety are generally uniform and tapered on both ends. They do not grow as long as roots of Centennial in North Carolina. Oversize roots are usually blocky in shape.

Jewel, which is described as a high quality fresh market type that also possesses many good processing qualities, has "very good" keeping qualities, according to Dr. Pope.

The plant is a vigorous grower and produces a dense foliage. It produces a few more sprouts than Centennial but sprouts emerge two to four days later.

Jewel carries a higher degree of resistance to fusarium wilt than Centennial and similar to that of Nugget and Goldrush. Level of resistance to internal work is described as adequate for a commercial variety. It also appears to have good field resistance to nematodes.
