CHAPEL HILL — The 17th Annual North Carolina Press Women's Association Spring Institute will be held on the University of North Carolina campus here Saturday and Sunday, March 14-15.

More than 100 press women from across the State are expected to attend. Participants will register from 12-2:30 p.m. Saturday in the North Lounge of the Carolina Inn.

The Institute will feature four workshops from 3:30-4:30 p.m. Saturday, conducted by UNC Journalism School faculty members, Dean John B. Adams will conduct one entitled "Trends in Press Law," "What's Your Opinion—Books, Plays, Movies" will be the topic of a session led by Walter Spearman, Stuart Secretary will discuss "Photographs—Effective or Ineffective," and Ken Byerly will lead a discussion of "Decency in Reporting."

All workshops will be held in Howell Hall. A cocktail party and awards banquet will begin at 6:30 p.m. Saturday in the Carolina Inn Ballroom. Mrs. Paquita Jurgensen of the Chapel Hill Weekly, outgoing president, will preside. Presenting awards will be Tom Fesperman, managing editor of the Charlotte Observer. Pat Borden of the Observer is contest chairman.

The banquet program will consist of a routine of comic impressions and musical satire by Hope and Leonid Mihalap of Norfolk, Va., formerly of Chapel Hill.

A graduate of Vassar where she was active in dramatic and musical productions, Mrs. Mihalap is a former newspaper woman. She was named to the 1966 edition of "Outstanding Young Women of America." Her husband, a native of Russia, is professor of Russian at Old Dominion University and performs his native folk music on the balalaika and mandolin to his wife's piano accompaniment.

For Good Eating This Spring, Summer Combine Chicken And Biscuit Dishes

Plans have been finalized for the Seventh Annual North Carolina Chicken Cooking Contest, to be held in Raleigh, March 17. The contest, to be held at the Food Science Building at North Carolina State University is a state-wide contest sponsored by the North Carolina Poultry Processors in cooperation with the North Carolina Poultry Federation, the North Carolina Department of Agriculture, Carolina Power and Light Company, and Duke Power Company. According to Elaire Johnson of the Department of Agriculture, who is coordinating the contest activities, approximately 700 Tar Heels have entered the contest and of that number, 15 have been selected to compete in the contest on the 17th of March in Raleigh. The winner of the North Carolina Chicken Cooking Contest will compete in the National Finals, to be held in Princess Anne, Maryland in June, 1970. Prizes for the contest winners from North Carolina include: electric outdoor grills, electric mixers, and other electrical appliances given by Carolina Power and Light Company and Duke Power Company.

Mrs. Robert W. Scott, wife of the Governor of North Carolina will be guest speaker at a luncheon following the cook-off. The luncheon is to be held at the Velvet Cloak in Raleigh, and the contest winners will be recognized and awarded prizes at that time.

This is the 7th year the North Carolina Poultry Processors have sponsored the contest, and North Carolina is the only state that holds a preliminary contest prior to the national one.

The gross income from poultry and poultry products in North Carolina was over 350 million dollars during the last year, and the broiler industry alone ranks as the second most important source of North Carolina agricultural income.
