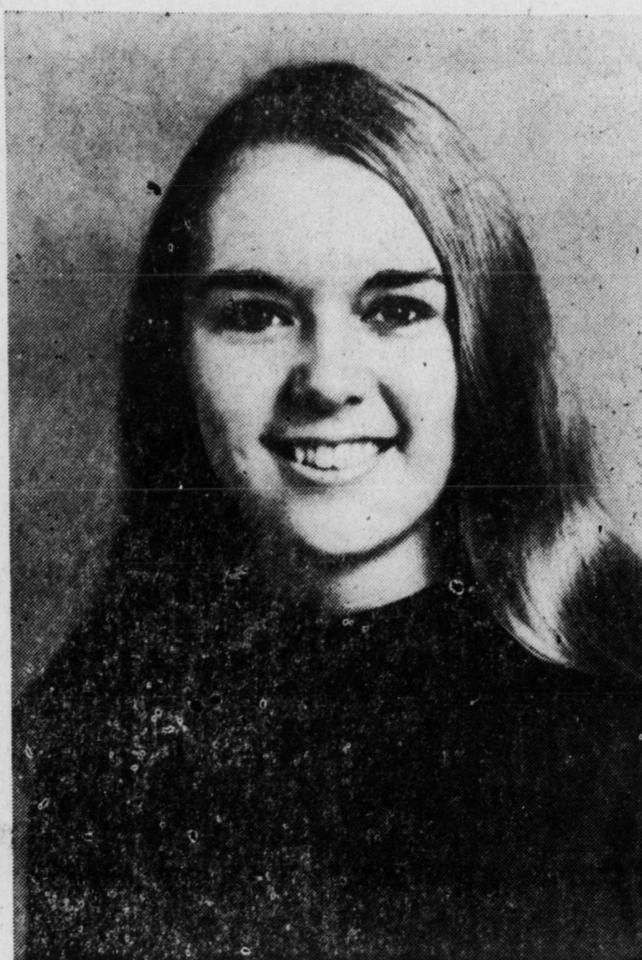




MRS. WILTON GRAVES CANADY

Make-It-Yourself With Wool Contest And Fashion Show Is Slated Oct. 24

The annual "Make It Yourself With Wool" Fashion Show will be held at the First United Methodist Church, Marion, North Carolina on Saturday, October 24, at 1:30 p.m. to select three Junior and three Senior winners who will compete in the state contest. The first place district winner in the sub-division will also be announced by Mrs. James S. Bolton, District I Director. District I is comprised of the following counties: Ash, Alleghany, Wilkes, Iredell, Mecklenburg, Gaston, Lincoln, Catawba, Alexander, Caldwell, Watauga, Burke, Cleveland, Rutherford, McDowell, Avery, Mitchell, Yancey, Madison, Buncombe, Polk, Henderson, Transylvania, Haywood, Jackson, Swain, Macon, Graham, Clay, and Cherokee.

The program is co-sponsored annually by the N. C. Auxiliary to the National Wool Growers Association and the American Wool Council, a division of the American Sheep Producers Council, with National headquarters in Denver, Colorado. These girls selected the fabrics—which must be made of

100% wool loomed in America—patterns and accessories and constructed their own garment which they will model. Fabric, pattern, styles, accessories and construction will be judged. The state competition will be held November 14, 1970 at Belk's Department Store in Raleigh, North Carolina.

Winners in their state contests will represent at Denver, Colorado, January 22, 1970. The national junior and senior winners will be selected at the national fashion show to be held in conjunction with the annual convention of the National Wool Growers Association. Prizes for the District I contest winners are contributed by these national firms: Unique Zipper, Seattle, Washington; Bone Bell Inc., Cleveland, Ohio; and the Butterick Co., Coats and Clark Inc., John Dritz & Sons Inc., and Modes Royale — all of New York. Mrs. Shirley Koone, educational representative with Doncaster and Tanner will be the narrator for the style show.
