Fruit And Vegetable Outlook Includes More Mechanization

More mechanization and improved merchandising are worthwhile objectives for North Carolina's fruit and vegetable industries to shoot for in 1971.

Labor costs are rising, demanding the mechanization, and competition for markets continues to be keen, suggesting a need for an increased selling effort.

"The need will increase to substitute capital for labor at the harvesting and processing levels for all fruits and vegetables except those produced for specialized local markets," commented E. A. Proctor, North Carolina State University economist.

Calling attention to apples, Proctor said the U. S. supply of red and golden delicious apples will increase in 1971. Harvest-time prices may be below normal for the Tar Heel product. Some price weakness could be countered by improving the quality of packed apples, allocating to more consuming centers and increasing merchandising efforts.

The national supply of fresh market tomatoes during the N. C. vine-ripened marketing season in 1971 will probably be large enough to depress prices below the long-run average. However, prices usually are high enough to cause even more production. Proctor believes a general tomato price level slightly below normal is likely in the future.

Under these conditions, Proctor suggested, the best opportunities in 1971 for the Tar Heel tomato industry will be a slightly expanded output for more efficient producers, a better quality product, expanded sales in the South and other nearby markets and increased selling efforts.

North Carolina sweet potatoes held in long-term storage will probably sell at prices above early season price plus storage cost. The size of the 1971 North Carolina crop will probably equal that of 1970 with the expectation that the national production cycle will be in a downward phase.

Proctor believes moving into new areas and making seasonal shifts in choice of markets will be necessary to increase net revenues from steadily expanding production of apples, blueberries, vine-ripened tomatoes and sweet potatoes.
