Drug Abuse Films Top Request List

Interest in the drug problem is at fever pitch if requests for films on "drug abuse" from the State Board of Health Film Library are an indication. "We could double the number of films on drugs available (175) and still not have enough to meet the demand," says Roger Whitley, head of the film service.

During the last half of 1970, "drug abuse" films were booked for showing 3,286 times in every county in North Carolina. Junior and senior high schools lead all organizations with a total of 2,073 bookings. Drug films were shown to every junior and senior high school class in Raleigh. Included among other organizations booking "drug abuse" films were churches, technical institutes, police departments, hospitals and health departments. A total of 29 different groups or individuals borrowed films on drugs during the six-month period.

Interest in "drug abuse" films picked up markedly in 1969, according to Whitley. "Until then, the public didn't show any particular interest in films on drugs," Whitley said. "As a matter of fact, prior to 1969 we didn't have a single film on marijuana—now we have 36. Our inventory of drug films describes just about every harmful drug being used today and the dreaded effects encountered in its use," he said.

The State Board of Health Film Library was established in 1942.
