have seen a lot of good prospects. But I haven't seen anybody to compare with David Thompson of Crest. He can play anywhere." Appalachian is at a disadvantage in recruiting. The Boone school is in the process of entering the NCAA and hopefully the Southern Conference. So ASU has to recruit on the 1.6 scale. "Of course, there's nothing definite about going to the Southern Conference," says Hussey, "but everybody is real confident that we will. And we're recruiting under NCAA rules."

One of the big men Appalachian hopes to land is 6-6 Cliff White of Wayne Community College.

"We think we have a good chance at some good big men," says Hussey. "But you never actually know for sure. Kids will show a lot of interest but until you actually get them, you can't count on them."

Appalachian's varsity outfit posted a miserable 8-16 record this trip and the Mountaineers will need all the help they can get next year.

It might be that they'll go after some junior college boys, as the freshman team's better players were the little guards, Barnes and Davis.

Whether or not Hussey figures in ASU's future remains to be seen. He had an enviable 65-6 won-lost record in three years at Kings Mountain and he took a freshman outfit this year that was supposed to be a loser and turned it into a winner.

Like the high school players he's trying to recruit, Hussey's being look at. It's just a matter of time before someone grabs him.

Scientists Can Now Watch Living Lungs At Work; Taking A Breather

Scientists can now watch living lungs at work. How? Well, through windows placed in the chest walls.

Almost everything that is known about diseased lungs has been discovered from dead lungs. After a lung has been stained, shrunk, and prepared for study, though, it may no longer resemble the living lung. Even the technique of rapidly freezing the lung does not permit continuous observations.

At the Northwestern University School of Medicine in Chicago, Dr. Richard Harbord has developed the techniques to see lungs in action. He inserts a plexiglas cut-shaped window into a rabbit's chest wall. The window is inserted on the right side, replacing the sixth and seventh ribs which have been removed.

The rabbit's lung is drawn up against the plexiglas by suction, and the lung surface can be examined with a type of light microscope. Photographs can be taken with the aid of an electronic flash held over the window.

The trouble with the technique is that it doesn't reveal what happens in the part of the lung below the surface. But it is an important development in direct observation of living lungs at work. The observation can help in the fight against respiratory diseases.

One of the specific problems Dr. Harbord is concerned with is atelectasis, a condition which involves a collapse of the air sacs of the lungs. In humans, there are 300 million air sacs in each lung, where oxygen and carbon dioxide are exchanged.

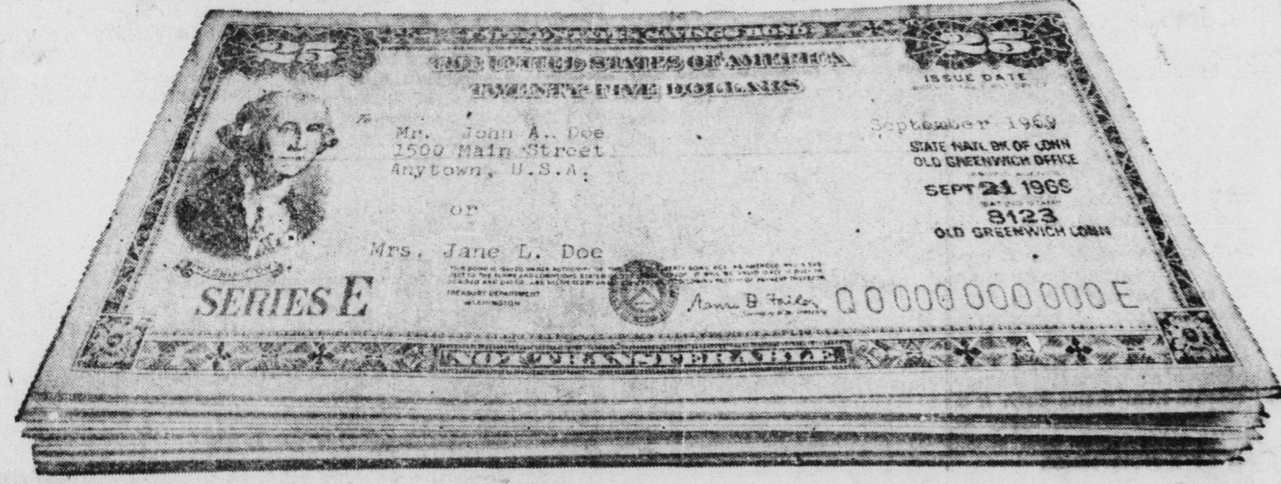

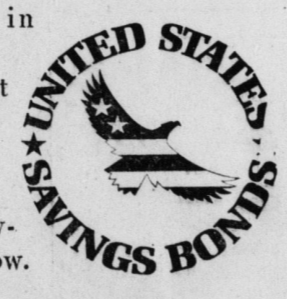
