

MORE ABOUT Sewer Use

(Continued from Page One) have reviewed the proposed sewer use ordinance for the town of Kings Mountain and feel that it contains the provisions necessary for the proper regulation of sewerage characteristics. This ordinance will assist greatly in protecting the lives and property of the citizens of Kings Mountain and providing the highest possible degree of treatment at your waste water treatment plant.

The ordinance "regulating the connection of private utility lines inside and outside the corporate limits with the public utility lines of the city of Kings Mountain" bans putting of toxic effluence into the sewer system, controls the quality of waste on the basis of biological oxygen demand and regulates the flow of waste into the system.

A permit and inspection fee of \$5 will be charged for a residential or commercial building sewer permit and \$15 for an industrial building sewer permit.

Article Five of the ordinance details the use of the public sewers and specifies the types and amounts of discharges banned from the system. The system superintendent has the authority to waive the provisions, subject to the approval of the board of commissioners, "when he determines that the quantity of the waste discharged by any person is so small in relation to the overall flow into the city system as to make the offending characteristics of the waste negligible."

This same article also provides for the building of storage tanks for person's discharging waste into the system having specified daily volumes over a period of a normal work week. The storage tanks, reservoir or pond will be constructed at the person's own expense.

Full text of the ordinance will be published by the city as a legal notice in next week's Herald

HOUSING The Housing Authority has completed 150 new units that are now occupied. Another 50 units are under construction and will be occupied in early spring. The Kings Mountain Real Estate Association continues to provide leadership for new construction with the cooperation of City Government. Kings Mountain has led the way in new housing starts in Cleveland County for the past two years. It is this type of leadership that can successfully cope with the future housing needs of our Community.

COMMUNITY CENTER In 1968, I promised the reality of a Community Center. It is now complete and in use. We now have a facility that will afford public recreation and various community functions to serve all our Citizens. Our planned public recreation program will be fully expanded to utilize every aspect which this modern complex can offer. in the control of sleeping sickness. The McGills found the climate surprisingly good with an evening temperature of 60 and from 88-90 in the daytime. Two seasons, the rainy season, from September to June, and the dry season from the weather pattern in this country one-third the size of the United States with a population of only 20,000,000 people.

Their hospital is near the diamond area where 70-80% of industrial diamonds are mined. Nationalistic control since independence from Belgium, has resulted in some changes: 1) a fine secondary school, established in 1960 was a great improvement as the Belgium government only supported elementary schools; 2) National control of mission work, but the government is glad to have medical assistance and there is a great need for teachers, mechanical advisors and agriculture is wide open, "Farmers use only a crude hoe and have no beasts of burden—except their wives whom they use quite well," Dr. McGill said. 3) Although most of industry is still operated by foreign interest, the Congolese is gradually being given more important positions. 4) Political life is under native control.

Speaking of the great natural resources and possibilities for growth, Dr. McGill told of a Congolese man, from the thatched roof bush country, who has graduated from Davidson and is currently studying medicine in Liege, Belgium, who plans to return to his own country to work.

Dr. and Mrs. McGill and their children Linda and Jimmy, now living in Greenwood, S. C., were guests for the weekend of Dr. and Mrs. J. C. McGill. Another son, Kenny, is an Erskine College freshman.

Mrs. McGill in a recent talk in Kings Mountain spoke of the high mortality rate among babies due to their being fed a form of cake which contains no nutritive value.

Much of her work consisted in preparing a porridge of readily available materials and of teaching mothers to prepare this food in an open kitchen recently constructed near the hospital.

Board Approves Recommendations

The city commission Tuesday night adopted the W. K. Dickson Company's recommendations on sewer improvements.

They included a new outfall line for domestic waste in the north end of town and receiving Craftsman Yarn's waste at the Polit Creek sewer treatment plant. Col. W. K. Dickson, the city's consulting engineer, told the board.

In another action, the board awarded, subject to concurrence by the Gaston County Board of Commissioners, a bid of \$7,956 by Lonnie Turner of Casar for water and sewer lines in the State Road 1433 area, the other bidder was A. P. White Associates of Charlotte with \$17,906.

The water and sewer lines will serve DeRose Industries in the city's Industrial Park which is located in Gaston County. Gaston County is paying for the project.
