Herald Sets New Picture Policy


The Herald is setting a new policy on pictures to be pub lished in the future and seeks the cooperation of its readers and customers in making the change.

Also, all brides pictures and birthday pictures must be in the Herald office no later than Monday for inclusion in that week's edition.


