There is no way the government can adequately compen-sate any family for such a sacrifice. But it is my sincere feeling that we should not ask a family to undergo the possibility that such a tragedy may occur more than once."

Broyhill's amendment would xpand the existing draft exemption for sole surviving sons, who are defined by law as the only remaining son in a family which has lost a member in military service.

"I do not think we can that the loss of a son is less be-cause there are others remaining in a family," Broyhill stated. "This, in effect, is what we are saying in the sole surviving son exemption."

The amendment would apply to families who have lost mem-mers in Vietnam, World War II
