**House Approves  
Broyhill Draft  
Law Amendment**

The House of Representatives Thursday adopted an amendment to the draft law, proposed by Congressman James T. Broyhill of Lenoir, North Carolina, which would exempt from the draft any young man if a member of his family was killed or died in service or as a result of service connected injuries.

The Broyhill amendment was adopted by a vote of 130 to 41 during consideration of a bill to extend the draft and increase military pay and benefits.

"I am extremely pleased that my amendment could be adopted by such an overwhelming majority," Broyhill stated. "I have been personally acquainted with many families who have suffered the loss of a son or father in Vietnam. There is no way the government can adequately compensate any family for such a sacrifice. But it is my sincere feeling that we should not ask a family to undergo the possibility that such a tragedy may occur more than once."

Broyhill's amendment would expand the existing draft exemption for sole surviving sons, who are defined by law as the only remaining son in a family which has lost a member in military service.

"I do not think we can say that the loss of a son is less because there are others remaining in a family," Broyhill stated. "This, in effect, is what we are saying in the sole surviving son exemption."

The amendment would apply to families who have lost members in Vietnam, World War II and Korea.

To Tax Forms**

GREENSBORO — Taxpayers who file Forms 1040-X to correct an omission or error they made in filing their 1970 tax returns are cautioned to attach necessary schedules and explanations to the 1040-X to substantiate the additional items.

"For example," J. E. Wall, District Director, said, "if a taxpayer omitted his medical deduction on his original return and files a form 1040-X to correct the omission, he must also attach a list of doctors, hospitals, etc. to whom he paid the amounts, just as is required on a regular return."

Wall said that forms 1040-X and schedules can be obtained at any IRS office or by telephoning free to Greensboro IRS Centiphone.
