Miss Sharp was weekend guest of Mrs. W. D. Werner.

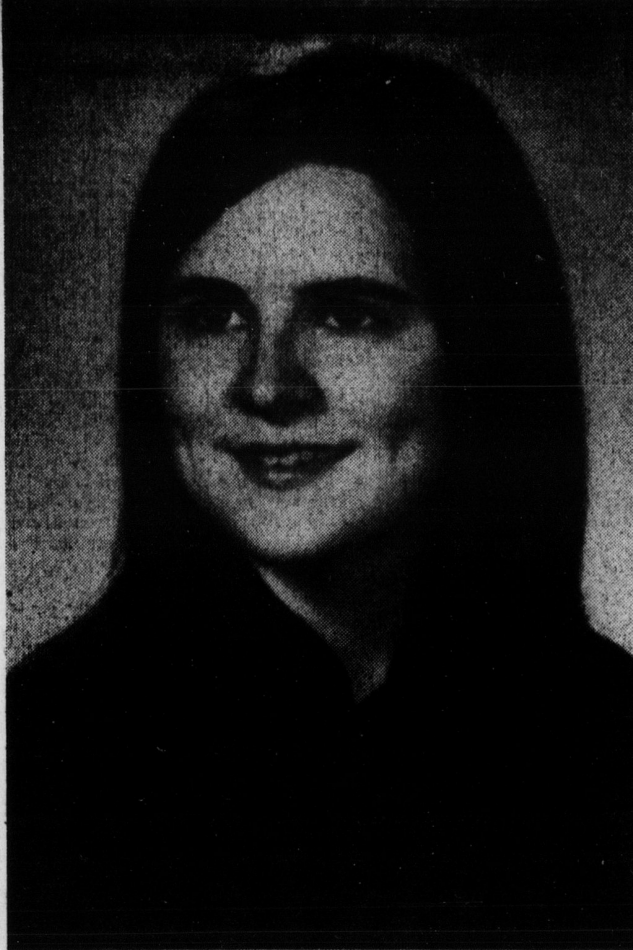
It's A Boy For Jerry Gantts
