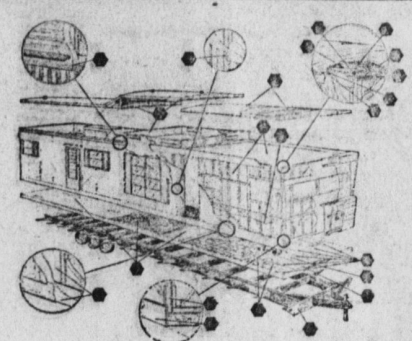

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REORGANIZATION

Changing times and new priorities require the rearrangement of government programs to meet present needs. The White House has proposed a number of major changes in the organization and structure of Federal activities. Last week, the first of these reorganization plans was given final consideration and approval by the House of Representatives.

Under the terms of the President's executive reorganization authority, the Congress has 60 days from the date of the submission of a plan to consider and work its will on a measure of this kind. In a sense, this is a Congressional veto process in which the Congress may disapprove any such action by the President and demand that the plan be cancelled. If the Congress fails to act, the plan becomes operative. However, in almost all cases, the Congress prefers to evaluate what is being proposed and to bring the question to a vote by the full membership of one or both of the houses of Congress. It was this latter procedure that was followed in the case of this so-called "Reorganization Plan No. 1" which the President sent to Congress on March 24.

This plan, I believe, is a good one in that it groups together in one place a number of wide-ranging Federal volunteer programs that had been scattered through many agencies.

Starting with the Peace Corps ten years ago, the concept of volunteerism has grown into a number of programs. Each of these activities has a self-contained structure of its own, often duplicating functions essential to the operation of each program. The President plans to bring these voluntary service programs together in the belief that they can be operated more effectively and more economically.

Under the plan, the new parent agency would be known as Action. Included in it will be the Peace Corps, now administered by the Department of State, and the Office of Volunteer Action, now directed by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. The VISTA program, now a part of the Office of Economic Opportunity, will also become part of the new agency. In addition, such present programs as the Retired Senior Volunteer program, now a part of Health, Education, and Welfare, will be transferred along with that Department's Foster Grandparent program. The Service Corps of Retired Executives and the Action Corps of Executives, which are both part of the Small Business Administration, will be added to the list to be administered by Action. At a later time, the President will request permission of the Congress to move the Teacher Corps from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare to this new agency.

All these actions are considered a first step toward the achievement of a number of goals. These goals should make possible the greater usefulness of the programs to which many thousands of Americans have contributed their time, energy, and talents. Administratively, the plan should give a new consistency of approach to questions of research and policy-setting so that total experience can be melded into exploring new approaches to the use of volunteer services. Economies ought to result by providing a base for joint recruiting of volunteers, training activities, and a variety of costly but necessary administrative support functions.

After its review of the plan, the House Government Operations Committee effectively summarized my feelings and those, I believe, shared by a majority of the Members of the Congress. It concluded that, "The concept of volunteerism is itself a noble one and brings forth the best in our citizens, who, either because they have the time or because they have certain advantages, desire to help others less fortunate. Of course, volunteerism has had a long history under possibly different names in the private sector. Only recently has government sought to mobilize such

It is certainly true that we have seen in the operation of some of these programs that there are vast resources existing among young people and their more experienced elders. We now seek to use these resources more effectively for the contribution they can make toward the solution of some of the nation's problems.
