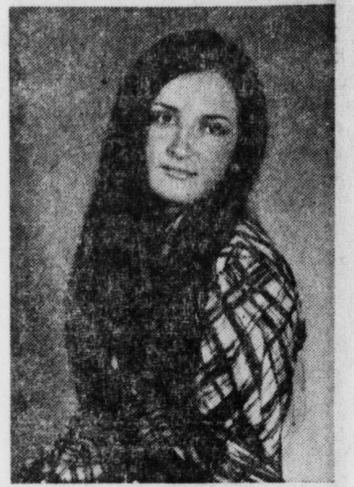


Debbie Brown Plans To Study In Europe
