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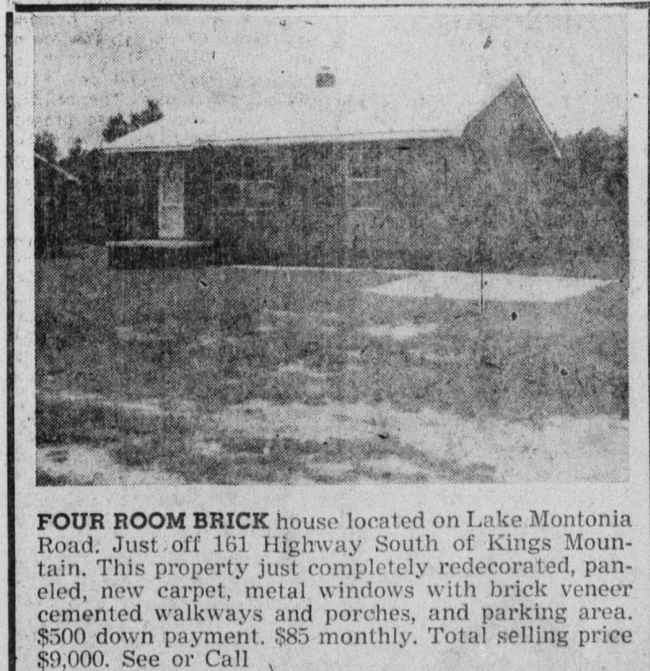

CHARLOTTE, N. C. — Banjo Matthews, the veteran car builder from Asheville, N. C., has announced that he will prepare a 1971 Chevrolet Monte Carlo for Cale Yarborough to drive in the \$107,000 National 500 race at Charlotte Motor Speedway on October 10.
The bespectacled master mechanic's record at the mile and a half track includes two wins and a trio of second place finishes and winnings as driver of car owner in excess of \$12,000. Matthews prepared the winning cars driven by Donnie Allison in the 1959 National 500 and 1970 World 600 races. Allison also finished second in the 1968 and '69 World 600 races. The other second place was earned in the 1962 fall event, then run over a 400 mile distance, with the late Fireball Roberts driving the Matthews entry.
Yarborough, of Timmonsville, S. C., set a NASCAR Grand National record in 1968 with four superspeedway victories and over \$136,000 in season earnings. During his best year in stock cars Yarborough won 500 miles at Darlington, Atlanta, and Daytona plus a victory in the 400 mile event at Daytona.
Following a win in the American 500 at North Carolina Motor Speedway last November, Yarborough withdrew from NASCAR competition to concentrate on the United States Auto Club's championship cars where he drives for Atlanta Sportsman Gene White. In the recent USAC Charlotte 500 at Ontario Yarborough was running third when engine failure took him out of the race.
As a USAC competitor Yarborough is eligible to compete in the National 500 through the fall international sanctioning granted the event by the F.I.A. international sanctioning body of auto racing.
In 16 previous starts at Charlotte the 32 year old former football star from South Carolina has won \$36,377, started from pole position three times and still holds the all time qualifying record of 162.162 miles per hour set in qualifying for the 1969 National 500 while driving the Wood Brothers Mercury. The October race will mark Yarborough's first start in a Chevrolet. All previous races have found 1968 Ford Mustang Man of the Year in Ford of Mercury models.
Matthews, who has prepared cars for such racing notables as Roberts, Allison, Nelson Stacy, Bobby Johns and A. J. Foyt, will be making his first appearance as a car owner of the 1971 season although he did serve as crew chief for a Mercury driven by Allison in the February Daytona 500. The car wrecked while leading that event.
In announcing his entry for the 12th annual fall classic at Charlotte, Matthews stated, "We want to come back like we left. And that is out front. We intend to win the pole position at Charlotte, lead every lap, win the race and take home as much of Charlotte Motor Speedway's money as possible."
"Junior proved a Chevy can be competitive," Matthews added.

Cale Yarborough To Drive Chevy In National 500

Thompson And Phillips Cited
BOILING SPRINGS, N. C. — Two linemen, Lee Thompson and Steve Phillips, were named Players of the Week for the Gardner-Webb Bulldogs who upset Lehigh-Blyne Saturday night 24-20.
Thompson, a 225 pound senior from Mableton, Ga., had an outstanding night against the Bears in Hickory. Thompson is one of the Bulldogs linemen.
He led the team in individual tackles with 10 and had 14 assists. He also intercepted a pass and returned it 21 yards for a touchdown. The 245 pounder blocked the extra point try for the Bears and broke a pass, recovering it for the Bulldogs.
Thompson also made one tackle which caused the ball carrier to fumble.
Thompson also had 170 yards in defense as he had seven interceptions, 100 yards in defense, 10 interceptions and was also one of the Bulldogs' most consistent performers.
Phillips, a 6'11", 225 pound offensive tackle from Albemarle, was the top offensive player. He started the season as an offensive center, but was shifted to tackle when a surprise in death developed. He recovered two punts in the game, and showed excellent judgment in his blocking, plus exhibiting some fine second efforts.
Olen Aye Line Coach Cole Price said that "Phillips has made a solid change from center to tackle and we are well pleased with his progress. He did a fine job Saturday night."

Immunization Survey Opens
A number of families in this area will take part in the 1971 National Immunization Survey to be conducted the week of September 20 by the Bureau of the Census, according to Joseph D. Neward, Director of the Bureau's regional office in Charlotte.
The annual immunization survey is part of a national program coordinated by the U. S. Public Health Service to determine the number of children and teenagers who have been immunized against influenza, smallpox, polio, diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, and measles.
The questions of immunization will be in addition to the usual ones asked in the Bureau's monthly survey of employment and unemployment conducted for the U. S. Department of Labor. Results of the monthly survey provide a continuous measure of economic conditions in the country.
Facts supplied by individuals participating in this voluntary survey are kept strictly confidential by law and results are used only to compile statistical tables.

The Veterans Corner
Editor's Note: Below are authoritative answers by the Veterans Administration to some of the many current questions from former servicemen and their families. Further information on veterans benefits may be obtained at any VA office or your local veterans service organization representative.
Q.—I am moving next month. Should I notify VA or the Treasury Department so I'll get my pension check at my new address?
A.—You should notify the VA regional office where your records are filed giving your claim number and your old and new address. Also notify your post office but not the Treasury Department.
Q.—I changed from college to a vocational school and now would like to make a second change. Is this permissible under the GI Bill?
A.—Yes, VA may approve the second change if after counseling the new program is found to be keeping with your abilities and interest and if there is a reasonable chance you can successfully complete the program.
Q.—Who is eligible for a mobile home loan?
A.—Veterans and eligible widows of World War II, Korean conflict, Post Korean conflict, Vietnam era; waves of service; tured for more than 90 days, and men missing in action or captured for more than 90 days and at least 181 days of active duty.
Of the 51.2 million families in March 1970, 5.6 million were headed by a woman. Fifty-three per cent of the women family heads were in the labor force and more than three-fifth of these women workers were the sole support of their families. Almost a third of all families headed by a woman had income of less than \$3,000 in 1969. About a fourth of all women family heads were black. The median family income of such black families in 1969 was \$3,341, as compared with \$5,500 for families headed by white women.

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
