Drug Abuse Prevention Week

America's war on drug abuse is becoming an all-out attack, featuring preventive measures and highlighted by nationwide activity during Drug Abuse Prevention Week, proclaimed this year for October 3-9 by President Nixon.

Although the intensified action calls for a wide range of activities to fight drug abuse, this year's Drug Abuse Prevention Week relates particularly to parent-adolescent dialogues on the problem of drug abuse.

Termed "GAP Fests" (Groups of Adolescents and Parents, talking together) these meetings are being encouraged by the White House Special Action Office on Drug Abuse Prevention not only during the special week, but also on a long-term basis.

Adolescents have been brought in on planning sessions for "GAP Fests" and other Drug Abuse Prevention Week activities, and, if these prove successful, expanded to a "GAP Fest" and other programs popular with joint youth-adult groups will be developed into regular year-round activities.

Newsletters and other media of communication are the spearhead of Drug Abuse Prevention Week, informational aspects, however, and based on last year's experience, when the first special prevention week was announced by the president, all assistance is predicted for the media.

Major feature articles, drug abuse series, and a wealth of news action stories are a significant part of the massive informational and educational attack that print media, especially the nation's daily and weekly newspapers, are mounting for October. Many carry-over or extended activities, however, will continue through the year.

The nation's school system and religious organizations are also participating extensively in Drug Abuse Prevention Week, in addition to community agencies in the mental health field or related to it.

Washington Report

CANCER LEGISLATION

Cancer has become one of mankind's deadliest enemies. It rates more deaths in this country than heart disease in the number of lives it takes in this country. If the present incidence of cancer were to continue, one out of every four Americans who are alive today would contract this disease someday. For many of its victims, death is a slow and painful process. And for many families, the personal tragedy is compounded by the financial implication of a prolonged disease.

I feel that the conquest of cancer should be one of the most important efforts of our time. There is a growing consensus that our vast scientific and technological resources should promptly be marshaled in an unprecedented attack on this devastating disease. The President in his State of the Union Message and in a special message to the Congress in February, expressed his determination to wage a campaign against this dread disease. The House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, in which I serve, is presently holding hearings on this subject and I am confident meaningful

legislation will be enacted which will enable us to wage the battle against cancer.

The Congress had already shown its willingness to appropriate more funds for this purpose. Earlier this year in a supplemental appropriations bill, the Congress set aside an additional \$1.9 million for the new Cancer Conquest program. However, this must be merely a first step toward further action, if we are to succeed in our efforts to find ways to arrest this deadly disease. More research must be undertaken. We must find a way to attract the nation's most talented doctors and scientists and provide them with the facilities they need to undertake an extensive research program. I have supported this program and will further support the proposal to set up an independent agency under the National Institutes of Health whose purpose would be to energetically conduct a national program of the conquest of cancer.

ETA-GUARANTEED LOANS

Last week the House of Representatives extended the authority of the Farm Credit Administration for a definite period to make guaranteed loans for water and sewer loans, the farm ownership loan program, and

the association loan program for grazing loans. Under previous legislation, the authority to guarantee loans of this type would have expired on October 1, 1971. The Farm Credit Administration to continue these important programs. These programs have been a valuable economic boost to many rural communities and in light of the many problems which face these communities it is essential they continue.

POVERTY PROGRAM

One of the House considered the extension of the Office of Economic Opportunity Act, the legislative battle continued as to how we could best deal with poverty in our nation. The House passed last week a program of the Economic Opportunity Act for another two years and authorized an additional \$2 billion for these programs.

Since the inception of this program in 1964, billions of dollars have been spent to fight the war on poverty. However, repeated incidents have shown that very little of this money was actually reaching the poor. No one would argue with the goals of this program, but in practice it just has not worked. The lack of direction for this program has led to the creation of another large bureaucracy that is accountable to no one. For these reasons, there has been increasing evidence that the largest share of funds have

Protect Quality Of Frozen Food

RALIEGH -- To get the most satisfaction from the wide selection of frozen foods sold today, family food shoppers are advised to protect the quality of frozen foods by keeping them cold enough and using them soon enough.

Storage at zero degrees or lower is recommended. At temperatures above zero, chemical changes in the food causes rapid loss of color, flavor, texture, and nutritive values, says Mrs. Ruby Uzzle, extension consumer marketing economist, North Carolina State University. She says that frozen food packages should be placed immediately in the freezer or next to the re-rigged space, but with space allowed for air purchases should be placed toward the back or bottom of the cabinet so older packs will be used first.

For large quantities of frozen food, it helps to write the date of purchase on each package and also to keep a record of each package in the freezer, showing the date it went in and when it should be used.

State University.

If temperature of the home freezer or freezing compartment is above zero, keep frozen foods no longer than a few days before using, she advises.

Mrs. Uzzle suggests shoppers select frozen foods carefully, avoiding packages that are damaged or soft. Frozen food displays cabinets should be clean with packages stacked no higher than the proper fill line, often shown inside the cabinet.

To prevent thawing, it pays to buy frozen foods last on a shopping trip. Carry them home in an insulated bag or use the paper bag inside of another.

Once they reached the home frozen food packages should be placed immediately in the freezer or next to the re-rigged space, but with space allowed for air purchases should be placed toward the back or bottom of the cabinet so older packs will be used first.

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PONCHO BIBS

It's easy to make generous poncho bibs for babies. Use one cotton terry bath towel for each bib.

Just cut a circle out of the towel's center, so you can slip the circle with cotton binding.

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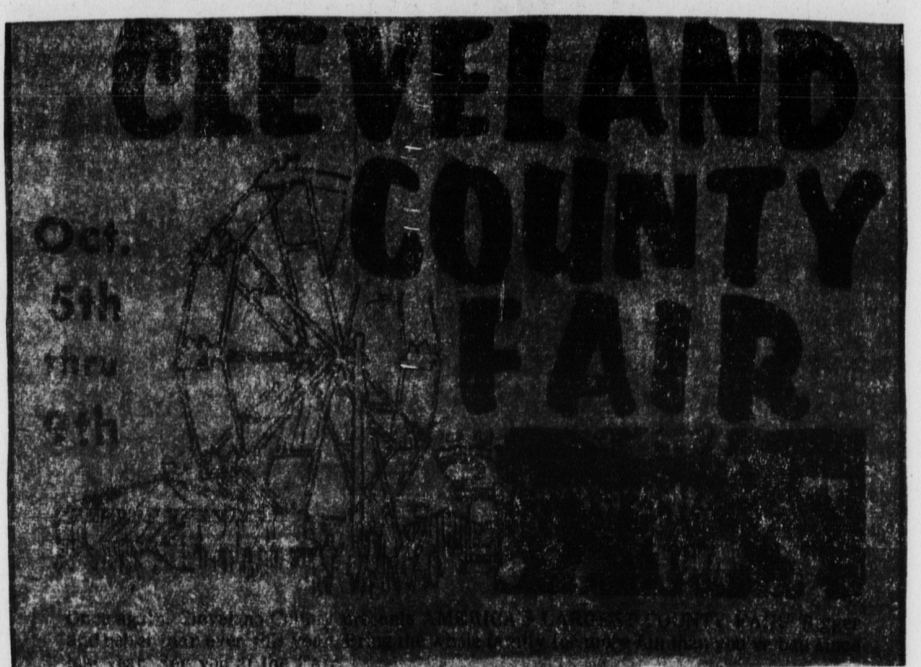
