Required for the construction of new building or repair estimated to exceed fifty dollars (\$50.00) before any work thereon is begun.

Recommendation to add: Sec. 7.9.1. Penalty for Failure to Comply

There shall be a penalty of double the actual cost of the permit for failure to comply with this Ordinance before any actual work is begun.

Code - Sec. 7.21. Moving Buildings
(a) Permit Required. Before a building or other structure shall be moved from the owner's premises, the owner thereof shall obtain a written permit from the Building Inspector.

(b) Fee. The fee for a moving permit shall be as follows:
(1) Any house or building with a utility connection, water, lights or power - \$10.00.
(2) Any house or building without a utility connection - \$2.00.

Recommendation to add: Sec. 7.9.1. Penalty for Failure to Comply

A penalty of double the cost of a permit for moving buildings shall be charged to those who be in this type of work without the proper permit.

Code - Sec. 7.22. Demolition of Buildings
Before the demolition of any structure is begun a verified application containing a statement of the facts in relation thereto and to the ownership and location thereof, shall be submitted by the owner of his authorized representatives to the Building Inspector and a written permit for such operation shall be obtained from him. Such permit shall expire, by limitation, two (2) months from the date of its issuance. The Building Inspector shall be given not less than twenty-four (24) hours notice before the demolition of the structure may be begun.

Recommendation to add: Sec. 7.2.1. Penalty for Failure to Comply

For those who begin to demolish a structure without the proper permit, the cost for violating Code shall be double that which would normally be charged for a demolition permit.

Graham Closes Charlotte Crusade

CHARLOTTE—Adding splashes of contemporary color but preaching the same old-fashioned Gospel, Evangelist Billy Graham last week brought a five-day mini-crusade to his hometown where he held his first Crusade 25 years ago.

He warned that while God would judge the people of India and China "according to the light given them," Americans and others who heard and ten rejected the Gospel would be "held even more responsible." "Because we have heard so much, so often, our judgment will be the greater," he said. The Charlotteans responded in greater numbers per capita of attendance than Graham had ever seen in the United States.

It was his briefest Crusade, but thousands were able to watch it by live television in North and South Carolina over ten different stations. The Charlotte Coliseum and the adjoining auditorium were overflowing each night, with hundreds turned away at most services.

Emergency Plan Adopted

An emergency plan for electrical system operation was adopted by the board of commissioners at Monday night's nearly three-hour meeting at City Hall.

The plan, as suggested by Comm. Norman King, states that in the event the demand for energy exceeds the bulk power supply available to Duke Power Co., the city's sole supplier of electricity, the city along with other Duke customers will:

1. Make a request through the news media asking customers to voluntarily curtail use of electricity for non-essential purposes. In addition, a special contact will be made with large commercial and industrial customers to request they shed non-critical loads.

2. Should additional load reductions be required, two 60 minute interruptions on each distribution circuit which would be programmed over two five-hour periods from 9 a. m. to 2 p. m. and 4 p. m. to 9 p. m. could be put into effect to further reduce the city's load approximately 20 per cent. In connection with this plan, service to critical loads such as hospitals, water pumping stations and communication facilities will be maintained with alternate feeds and rafter switching where practical.
