Taylor Will Travel By Train

The Pat Taylor campaign train will roll down the main line of the Southern Railway from Reidsville to Gastonia on Wednesday, May 3.

The 300-passenger special will stop briefly for Taylor rallies in Reidsville, Greensboro, High Point, Thomasville, Lexington, Salisbury, Kannapolis, Concord, Charlotte, Belmont and Gastonia. Lieutenant Governor H. Pat Taylor will be accompanied on the all day trip by his family (Beth, 15; Hoyt, 12; and Lockhart, 9), state and local dignitaries, campaign staff, supporters and the press corps.

Music introductions and a talk by the Democratic candidate for governor will be featured at each stop.

The Pat Taylor bandwagon train will carry four passenger cars, a press car and a special observation car from which the candidate will speak. The train's full schedule will be released next week.
