**Safe Drivers Deserve Reduction
Ingram Raps Auto Rate Hike**

State Representative John Ingram, in an address to a Belmont civic club, rapped the recent insurance rate increases.

Ingram, a candidate for Insurance Commissioner asked following the first increase, "How many more secrets are in store for the people of North Carolina?" This 7.7% liability hike was followed by a fire insurance increase. These rate increases were made three weeks prior to the price freeze in July, 1971 and were not revealed until April, 1972.

Ingram said the people were fed up with the high cost of insurance and that he would support any responsible plan—no fault or otherwise—but he has the best plan. As Insurance Commissioner he will reduce car insurance by one-third for every safe driver in North Carolina.

Representative Ingram is the only Candidate not connected with the insurance industry. As Insurance Commissioner, he will abolish the discriminatory Assigned Risk Pool and replace it with a better fair insurance plan.—No drunk driver will drive cheaper than a safe driving youth or anyone else—Each person will be rated on his individual driving record—He will reduce substantially the cost of car insurance for every safe driver in North Carolina.

KM Bowlers Have Their Own New Math

Five into 14 goes 11-12—maybe 13 or even 14 times. Three from five—plus another two—equals five. It all adds up to pin money. Modern math?

Huh uh—Carolina figurin'! It's been going on since 1961 with the exception of one year.

Down in North Carolina it's called Kings Mountain arithmetic. The classroom is the Mountain Lanes bowling center in this southern Carolina community a few miles out of Gastonia.

"We start our figuring on our way home," revealed John Dilling as the ten men and four women gathered to head home from the 42nd annual national tournament of the National Duckpin Bowling Congress at Willow Bowl.

"Next year we go to T-Bowl in Newington, Conn., and the cost will be a lot more than this year's trip to Richmond." The lanky captain continued. "We'll start saving immediately for the trip."

If they bank their checks from this year's winnings, they'll have a good start. In the top ten places after the weekend action, Kings Mountain names were on one leader, two second place teams, one third, two fifths and one seventh.

The tournament, which opened March 18, will close May 8. "We arrived Wednesday night," Dilling said, "and bowled two team matches, Thursday, at Plaza Bowl in the mixed doubles and the John Dennis singles. Our teams bowled at 3.6 and 9 later that day, Saturday was a repeat of Friday and if they had had an open spot, we would have been able to enter our 13th team."

Tournament rules allow walk-in entries if there is any available space. Dilling said he sent in 11 team entries and filled one open spot Friday. "Also, we had bowlers on Claude Case's teams from Eden, N. C. and two filled in for a Rhode Island team Saturday night."

"Most of our bowlers saw ac-

tion with four teams although some bowled with more," he added.

Teams may drop two bowlers to form another team under team rules as long as they don't exceed the average limits.

Top average man, according to Dilling, is Thomas Blanton with 117 while Mrs. Jenny Oates was high among the Kings Mountain women with 109. Low bowl-

er was in the 90s.

The Kings Mountain leader is the Tar Heels team in the mixed B team division. Plonk Oil, defending champions in the men's regular booster division, fell eight pins short and holds down second place.

In the men's booster division, the Wolf Pack stands fifth and the Mountaineers seventh. Three teams are among the top ten in

the mixed regular booster—Sea Cove Motel, second; Gates Shell, third and Hullender Tax Service, fifth.

The Dilling Heating Co. team, 1971 tournament mixed team champions, at Hagerstown, Md., missed the top ten in their bid to repeat.

Kings Mountain teams have won mixed regular booster team divisions in 1962, 1963 and 1968.
