ORDINANCE REDUCING AUTHORIZED AMOUNT OF SANITARY SEWER BONDS

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners for the City of Kings Mountain did on May 8, 1972 duly

adopt an ordinance authorizing \$113,000 Sanitary Sewer Bonds; and

WHEREAS, at the time of adoption of said ordinance it appeared that the City of Kings Mountain

had retired \$170,000 principal amount of indebtedness during the 1970-71 fiscal year, but it has been discovered that the actual amount of indebtedness retired was only \$169,000 due to the fact that a certain bondholder failed to present his bond for payment in a timely manner; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners is required to reduce the amount of bonds authorized pursuant to said ordinance, now, therefore:

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners for the City of Kings Mountain that the amount of Sanitary Sewer Bonds authorized to be issued pursuant to said ordinance is hereby reduced to \$113,000.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 22nd day of May, 1972, and was first published on the 25th day of May, 1972.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

NOTICE OF SALE \$116,000 CITY OF KINGS MOUNTAIN, NORTH CAROLINA SANITARY SEWER BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES

Sealed bids will be received until 11 o'clock A.M., Eastern Daylight Time, June 13, 1972, by the undersigned at its office in the City of Raleigh, North Carolina, for \$116,000 Sanitary Sewer Bond Anticipation Notes of the City of Kings Mountain, North Carolina, dated June 26, 1972, maturing on November 29, 1972, without option of prior payment, and bearing interest payable at the maturity of the notes to which no interest coupons will be attached. Delivery of the notes will be made on or about their date at place of purchaser's choice.

Bidders are requested to name the denomination or denominations, the interest rate, and the city or town and bank or trust company herein at which principal and interest will be payable. There will be no auction.

The notes will be awarded at less than par and accrued interest to the bidder offering to purchase the notes at the lowest interest cost to the City, such cost to be determined by deducting the total amount of any premium bid from the aggregate amount of interest upon all of the notes from their date to their maturity.

Each bid must be submitted on a form to be furnished with additional information by the undersigned, must be enclosed in a sealed envelope marked "Bid for Notes", and must be accompanied by an official bank check, a cashier's check, or a certified check upon an incorporated bank or trust company for \$550, payable unconditionally to the order of the State Treasurer of North Carolina, on which no interest will be allowed.

Award or rejection of bids will be made on the date above stated for receipt of bids and the checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned immediately. The check of the successful bidder will be held uncashed as security for the performance of his bid, but in the event the successful bidder shall fail to comply with the terms of his bid, the check may then be cashed and the proceeds thereof retained as and for full liquidated damages.

The unqualified approving opinion of Mitchell, Petty & Shetterly, New York City, will be furnished without cost to the purchaser. There will also be furnished the usual closing papers. The right to reject all bids is reserved.

ACCENT ON AGRICULTURE

THE FARMER'S IMAGE

Consumers feel "good" about farmers. This is confirmed by a survey conducted this spring for the Illinois Agricultural Association (Farm Bureau in Illinois) and by other surveys and polls taken in recent years.

Made in the six largest urban centers in Illinois, the survey showed that 85 per cent of city dwellers and suburbanites in Illinois feel "good" about farmers. Only 11 per cent feel "no so good," and four per cent weren't sure how they felt.

When consumers were asked who is "most to blame for the increase in meat prices," only four per cent cited farmers. Middlemen were blamed by the largest group (21 per cent). And 18 per cent put the responsibility on government. Another 18 per cent cited labor unions.

Seventy-one per cent were flatly opposed to reducing farmers' profits when asked what could be done to deal with "rising meat prices."

So, basically the farmer brings a pretty good image into his relationship with the consumer—and this in view of the early 1972 controversy over food prices. At the same time, it should be kept in mind that this survey was conducted in the largest urban centers in Illinois where only one out of eight of those surveyed were either raised on a farm or had friends or relatives that farm. The situation is greatly different in North Carolina where people even in the larger cities have closer ties with agriculture and, therefore, the farmer's "image" should be even higher because of greater understanding of his problems.

Naturally everyone is very concerned about food prices—including farmers. However, it was learned in the Illinois survey that the last thing the consumer wants done is anything that will hurt the American farmer.

MENTAL HEALTH NEWS

UNIFORM ALCOHOL ACT

One major problem for the nationwide attack on alcoholism has been the lack of uniformity throughout the country in laws dealing with intoxication and alcoholism.

This has particularly hampered the modern public health approach to the prevention and treatment of alcoholism and alcohol abuse as a disease.

Recent events, however, give promise that we can make great progress in this area. This comes with the development of a model new act by the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws.

Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Elliott Richardson has strongly endorsed this legislation, the "Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act," and recommended that it be passed by all of the states.

Adoption of the act would make it a state policy that alcoholics and intoxicated persons may not be subjected to criminal prosecution because of their consumption of alcoholic beverages. The act also requires that such individuals be provided appropriate treatment for their alcohol problems.

Secretary Richardson commended the Commissioners on Uniform State Laws for their action in this field and said: "This prototype legislation is evidence of a breakthrough in the nation's recognition of alcoholism and public intoxication as health issues, not criminal behavior."

"I strongly recommend that the legislature of each state adopt this law at the earliest possible time."

In most states, public intoxication is today still a crime. Nationally, it accounts for one-third of all arrests and one-half of all persons in jail in the U. S. each year.

Under the new act, individuals would receive necessary emergency medical treatment and follow-up care involving medical, psychological and social services, rather than being detained on criminal charges. To help carry out the program, the act also calls for a Division of Alcoholism within the state health or mental health department.
