CITY OF KINGS MOUNTAIN INVITATION TO BID

Sealed proposals will be received by the City of Kings Mountain, North Carolina, in the City Council Chamber, City Hall, 112 South Piedmont Avenue, Kings Mountain, North Carolina, until 7:30 p.m., November 13, 1972, at which time all bids will be publicly opened in the City Council Chamber and all bid prices read aloud for the following:

Rear Loading Refuse Compaction Unit, as specified

Truck Chassis and Cab for Rear Loading Refuse Compaction Unit, as specified.

No bid shall be considered or accepted by the City of Kings Mountain unless at the time of its filing the same shall be accompanied by a deposit of cash or certified check on some bank or trust company insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation in an amount equal to not less than five percent (5%) of the proposal. In lieu of making the cash deposit, bidder may file a bid bond executed by a corporate surety licensed under the laws of North Carolina to execute such bonds, conditioned that the surety will, upon demand, forthwith make payment to the obligee upon said bond if the bidder fails to execute the contract in accordance with the bid bond, and upon failure to forthwith make payment, the surety shall pay to the obligee an amount equal to the amount of said bid bond. This deposit shall be retained if the successful bidder fails to execute the contract within ten (10) days after the award or fails to give satisfactory surety as required herein.

The successful bidder shall be required to enter into a contract with the City of Kings Mountain in writing and shall be required to furnish bond in some surety company authorized to do business in the State of North Carolina or make deposit of money, certified check, or government sureties for the full amount of said contract for the faithful performance of the terms of said contract as required by Section 143-129 of the General Statutes of North Carolina.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL BOND ELECTION IN THE KINGS MOUNTAIN SCHOOL DISTRICT OF CLEVELAND COUNTY UPON THE QUESTION OF ISSUING \$2,500,000 SCHOOL BONDS

A special bond election will be held on Saturday, December 16, 1972, between 6:30 a. m. and 7:30 p. m., Eastern Standard Time, throughout the Kings Mountain School District of Cleveland County, which is comprised of the territory hereinafter described, at which there will be submitted to the qualified voters of said Kings Mountain School District the question of issuing not exceeding \$2,500,000 School Bonds for and in behalf of said School District for the purpose of providing funds, with any other available funds, for erecting, enlarging, altering and equipping school buildings in the Kings Mountain School District of Cleveland County, including the construction of a middle school, an auditorium for the high school, and improvements and additional facilities at the several schools in said school district in order to maintain the nine months' school term as required by Section 2 of Article X of the Constitution, and levying of sufficient tax for the payment thereof.

The boundary lines of the Kings Mountain School District of Cleveland County are as follows: "BEGINNING at the intersection of the Cleveland County - Gaston County line with the North Carolina-South Carolina line, thence west with the State Line to Buffalo Creek, thence north with the Buffalo Creek to the mouth of Beason's Creek, thence up Beason's Creek with the old No. 7, West-100 Special School Tax District line to the mouth of John McSwain's spring branch at Buffalo Creek, thence north with Buffalo Creek to a point in Coleman Goforth's farm due west the south boundary of Willis Williams' farm, thence with the northern boundary of the Bryan Poston Farm to the Oak Grove - Stony Point Road, thence south with said road to James C. Turner's west boundary, thence east to Muddy Fork Creek, then south to Penimmon Creek, thence with said creek through the farms of Joe A. Goforth, Coleman Goforth, R. A. Ware, James M. Lackey, J. L. Lackey, R. L. Lackey, Lawrence Bell, H. A. McFarland, touching the farm of William Whelstine on the north side, through the farms of R. L. Plonk, (second tract C. S. Plonk, then east to the Gaston County - Cleveland County line, thence south with the Cleveland - Gaston county line to the BEGINNING."

A map showing the boundaries of the Kings Mountain School District has been prepared and is available for inspection at the Office of the Kings Mountain City Board of Education, 500 West Parker Street, Kings Mountain, North Carolina. If said bonds are issued a tax will be levied upon all taxable property within the Kings Mountain School District of Cleveland County sufficient to pay the principal of and the interest on said bonds.

For said election the regular registration books for elections in the County of Cleveland will be used and the registration books, process of records will continue to be open for the registration of qualified persons and the acceptance of registration applications on Monday through Friday of each week between the hours of 9 a. m. and 5 p. m. at the office of the County Board of Elections at the County Courthouse in Shelby, and such days are Challenge Days.

The registrars will not attend the voting places except on the date of the election. The last day for new registration of those not now registered under Cleveland County's permanent registration system is Friday, November 17, 1972. Qualified voters who have moved residence from one precinct or township to another and have not transferred their registration should contact the County Board of Elections at its office at the County Courthouse in Shelby, or any registrar in the county and transfer their registration.

The last day for transferring registration is Friday, November 17, 1972. Qualified voters who are not certain whether they are registered should contact the County Board of Elections at the office of said Board in Shelby mentioned above.

Farm-City Week Set

Robert C. Barnett has been named Cleveland County Farm-City Week chairman for the 1972 observance of Farm-City Week. The appointment was announced by James E. Hunt Jr. of Wilson, state Farm-City Week chairman.

Serving with Mr. Barnett as co-chairman for the county committee is H. W. Dameron, county extension chairman.

Farm-City Week will be observed across the nation on November 17-23, ending on Thanksgiving day. The purpose of the event is to help create a better understanding between rural and urban people.

In appointing county Farm-City Week chairman, Hunt stated that North Carolina is fortunate to have a fine relationship between urban and rural citizens. "Farm-City Week can help to maintain and strengthen this relationship," he said.

Miss Marjett Decker of Asheville is serving with Hunt as state vice-chairman.

This will be the eighteenth annual observance of Farm-City Week. Last year's observance, according to final reports received at national headquarters, involved the active participation of more than 15,000 communities in the U. S. and Canada.

Farm-City Weeks is under the direction of a National Farm-City Council, Inc., headed by Dr. Corver C. Folks, Associate Dean, College of Agriculture, University of Missouri, Columbia, Missouri. "Kwanis International will serve as coordinating agency for Farm-City Week and act as headquarters for the National Farm-City Council for the eighteenth consecutive year.

The National Farm-City Council is composed of representatives from more than 150 major farm organizations, industries, businesses, association, governmental agencies, educational institutions, and church groups. A presidential proclamation and a joint congressional resolution have called for Farm-City Week observances each year since the inception of the event. Farm-City Week has won the Freedom Foundation's Distinguished Service Award, which carries the same distinction in the community service field as does the famed "Oscar" in the motion picture industry and the "Emmy" in the television field, and the Silver Anvil Award from the Public Relations Society of America for being the best community relations program of 1968.

Exchange Club Begins Project

The Exchange Club of Shelby Monday officially kicked off its One Nation Under God project with several club members beginning a series of talks in area schools.

The project, initiated by the National Exchange Club, designates the month of November as "One Nation Under God" month. The program actually began with the declaration of all towns claiming November as "One Nation Under God Month."

Members of the Exchange Club have placed cards containing the pledge to the One Nation Under God in area restaurants. "Exchanges" began Tuesday morning a series of talks in which club members will speak in some 24 schools in Cleveland County. The exchanges will also present flags and pamphlets concerning American heritage to each student at the schools they visit.

According to project chairman Billy Bains, over 90 per cent of the club membership will make at least one talk at one school in the county. In each instance at least two Exchanges will jointly make the presentations.

Distaff Deeds

This may be a good time to answer a backlog of questions. "About every three years we have trouble with stoppage in our sewer line. Do some trees clog lines worse than others?"

Perhaps elms, willows and poplars are the worst offenders but oaks and others will also clog lines. Certain chemicals may be used to keep lines open but most of us wait until the line clogs and call a plumber. Then we forget about it until the line clogs again.

If you are building a new home, have your contractor install a line which will prevent the entry of roots as they search for moisture.

"We hear much about the importance of light in growing house plants and how the light supply varies in different homes. Is a sun lamp of any value in supplying the plant needs for light?"

The sun lamp is designed to tan your hide and not your plants, as it produces a high percentage of ultra-violet (short wave) light. It is best to use ordinary incandescent bulbs.

"How much commercial fertilizer should I use on my house plants?"

While this question is difficult to answer with any degree of accuracy, you might use these figures as guidelines: using 8-8-8 as a basis, add one level teaspoonful to a six-inch pot; one level tablespoonful to an eight-inch pot; and about one-third teaspoonful to a four-inch pot.

For special formulations (tablets, liquid or granular) carefully follow the manufacturers' recommendations.

"How can I tell whether or not my house plants need to be repotted in a larger container?"

Spread the fingers of one hand firmly on top of the soil in the pot with the other hand, turn the pot upside down. Tap the rim of the pot gently until the ball slips out. If the roots have formed a thick solid mass on the outside of the ball of soil, the plant

The Veterans Corner

Q—How many Vietnam Era veterans are turned down for G.I. Bill benefits or disability compensation because of an other-than-honorable discharge?

A—A VA study done during a three month period of this year shows that only 6 out of every 1000 applicants were turned down, and most of these were discharged for "willful and persistent misconduct."

Q—I received a general discharge from the Army after 13 months of active duty. Am I entitled to schooling under the G.I. Bill despite this type of discharge?

A—Yes, and to all other benefits for which you would qualify under the same conditions that prevail for those with an honorable discharge.

Q—I read somewhere that I am entitled to an annual clothing allowance of \$150 because I have an artificial leg replacing one that was shot off in Korea. Is so, where do I apply?

A—You should have received by now a formal notice of potential eligibility from the VA with a simplified application form. If you did not write the VA Regional Office where your records are, stating that you wear a prosthetic device (or use a wheelchair) that tends to wear out or tear clothing, and that you receive service connected compensation for the disability, your letter will be accepted and processed as a claim for clothing allowance.

Mrs. Spivey Teacher of Year

The 1973 North Carolina Teacher of the Year is Mrs. Sarah Spivey, who teaches at North Ridge Elementary School in Wake County.

The announcement was made this morning by State School Superintendent Craig Phillips at a meeting of the State Board of Education in Raleigh. Dr. Phillips praised Mrs. Spivey, calling her "the kind of teacher we like to have in our classrooms."

Mrs. Spivey will be the state's candidate for National Teacher of the Year, an honor now held by the 1972 North Carolina Teacher of the Year, Jay Rogers of Durham High School in Durham. The award program is sponsored by the Council of Chief State School Officers, Encyclopedia Britannica, and the Ladies Home Journal.

Originally, there were 14 candidates for Teacher of the Year honors. That list was narrowed to two finalists following a series of interviews in Raleigh and Mrs. Spivey was selected after a visit to her classroom by a committee from the Learning Institute of North Carolina (LINCO). The other finalist was Mary Ann Oates, a Remedial Reading teacher at Southern Wayne Senior High School in Wayne County.

Mrs. Spivey, a native of Pender County, is one of four teachers who instruct a class of 109 fourth and fifth year students at North Ridge Elementary School. She received her B.A. degree from Campbell College and an M.Ed. from the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill. She has been teaching for eight years, three years at Brantwood Elementary School in Wake County and five years at North Ridge Elementary.

Mrs. Spivey comes from an education family. Her mother, Mrs. Leo Eakins, has been teaching for more than 35 years and now teaches the fourth grade at the same school as her daughter. Her husband, Richard, is employed by the Community College system, and she has an aunt who teaches in the Sampson County schools.

The new Teacher of the Year says she never considered any career but teaching. At the age of four she frequently visited her mother's classroom after school and began to teach her seventh grade class while they waited for the bus. Mrs. Spivey adds that "at the age of five I held class in the rear of my father's country store in rural Pender County. The customers became voluntary, or perhaps involuntary, students. When there were no human subjects, there were sufficient dolls or family pets to fill my classroom."

Asked to describe her philosophy of teaching, Mrs. Spivey replied, "teaching is much more than helping others to learn. It is the total involvement in the society in which we live. It is a way of life." Mrs. Spivey added, "teaching is learning. Indeed, the teacher can learn as much from her students as they can from her."

The Teacher of the Year has three sons, four-and-a-half year old twins, Christopher and Jonathan, and an eight year old, Coleman. The Spiveys live at 809 Peab-

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
