KINGS MOUNTAIN SCHOOL DISTRICT OF CLEVELAND COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA SCHOOL BONDS
Sealed bids will be received until 11 o'clock A.M. Eastern Daylight Time, May 29, 1973, by the undersigned at its office in the City of Raleigh, North Carolina, for \$2,500,000 School Bonds to be issued by Cleveland County, North Carolina, for and in behalf of Kings Mountain School District of Cleveland County. Said bonds will be dated June 1, 1973 and mature annually, June 1, \$100,000 1975 to 1984 and \$150,000

1985 to 1994, both inclusive, with but option of prior payment. Denomination \$5,000; principal and semi-annual interest (June and December 1) payable in legal tender at The Chase Manhattan Bank (National Association), in New York City; coupon bonds negotiable as to principal alone; delivery on or about June 25, 1973 at place of purchaser's choice. There will be no auction. The bonds will be payable from an unlimited tax to be levied upon all taxable property in the Kings Mountain School District of Cleveland County. The bonds were authorized at an election in the District held on December 16,

1972. Bidders are requested to name the interest rate or rates, not exceeding 6% per annum, in multiples of 1/4 or 1/10 of 1%, and each bidder must specify in his bid the amount and the maturities of the bonds of each rate. No interest rate bid may be more than two times the lowest rate named in the bid. No bid may name more than six interest rates, any of which may be repeated. All bonds maturing on the same date must bear interest at the same rate. The interest payable on any bond on any interest payment date shall be represented by a single coupon and the interest rate on such bond shall be the same throughout its life. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder offering to purchase the bonds at the lowest interest cost to the District, such cost to be determined by deducting from the total amount of any premium bid from the aggregate amount of interest upon all of the bonds from their date until their respective maturities. No bid of less than par and accrued interest will be entertained.

Each bid must be submitted on a form to be furnished with additional information by the undersigned, must be enclosed in a sealed envelope marked "Bid for Bonds", and must be accompanied by an official bank check, a cashier's check or a certified check upon an incorporated bank or trust company for \$50,000, payable unconditionally to the order of the State Treasurer of North Carolina, on which no interest will be allowed. Award or rejection of bids will be made on the date above stated for receipt of bids and the checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned immediately. The check of the successful bidder will be held uncashed as security for the performance of his bid, but in the event the successful bidder shall fail to comply with the terms of his bid, the check may then be cashed and the proceeds thereof retained as and for full liquidated damages. The purchaser of the bonds will be furnished without cost the un-

qualified approving opinion of Mitchell, Petty & Shetterly, New York City, to the effect that the bonds constitute valid and binding obligations of said County of Cleveland for and in behalf of said School District, all taxable real and tangible personal property within which School District is subject to the levy of an ad valorem tax, without limitation as to rate or amount, for the payment of the bonds and the interest thereon. Litigation recently instituted and pending in certain states (not North Carolina) respecting their present systems of levying taxes and expending funds for public school purposes, in the opinion of such counsel, will not result in a modification of the legal obligation of the bonds. The purchaser of the bonds will be furnished, at his request, a supplemental opinion of Mitchell, Petty & Shetterly to such effect. There will also be furnished the usual closing papers, including a certificate, dated as of the day of delivery of the bonds, stating that no litigation is pending (either in state or federal courts) or, to the knowledge of the signers of such certificate, threatened affecting the validity of the bonds and stating that no litigation is pending (either in state or federal courts) or, to the knowledge of such signers, threatened in North Carolina challenging the constitutionality of the North Carolina system of levying taxes and expending funds for public school purposes. The right to reject all bids is reserved.

25-Year Meter To Be Removed

City commissioners Monday night voted to permanently eliminate parking meters and to establish an all-day parking lot in the downtown area for employees of downtown businesses.

The parking meters had been removed last November for a trial period.

Permanent removal of the meters will put into effect a two-hour parking limit. Parking meter posts will be taken down.

Mayor John Moss, who recommended that the meters be removed, said that they were established downtown in 1948 and that several persons had already asked about purchasing a meter for a souvenir. That matter, Moss said, would be taken up at a later meeting.

The proposed all-day parking lot for downtown employees was suggested in order that those persons would not be levied fines for exceeding the two-hour parking limit. Moss said he foresees no problems in acquiring land for a parking lot.

In other business Monday night, the board:

- 1) Heard a report from Commissioner Norman King on the city's annual Clean-up, Fix-up, Paint-up campaign. King termed the campaign "most successful" and expressed appreciation to zone campaign chairmen for their work. On recommendation from Mayor Moss, the board appointed King as chairman of an Urban Beautification committee;
- 2) Referred to the zoning board a request from Harold J. Riddle that property on Second Street Extension be rezoned from R-8 to heavy industry for construction of a fabric plant;
- 3) Approved hiring the A. M. Pullen Co. of Charlotte to do the 1973 city audit;
- 4) Approved a resolution for paving and curb and gutter work on Joyce Street from Hillside Drive to Meadowbrook Road;
- 5) Heard a report from Mayor Moss that the city's application for a \$6400 grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development for updating the master zoning map and zoning program had received approval. The board authorized the mayor to appoint a committee to work with the city code's office and state commerce planning department to complete the study and bring recommendations back to the board.

Smith was permanently injured and his car was damaged beyond repair. May Smith recover damages against Butler?

Yes. Although Smith's automobile had no physical contact with the vehicle driven by Butler, the full amount of his personal injuries and property damages may be recovered in a judgment obtained against Butler.

It is not only a criminal offense to operate a motor vehicle, but it is also in a civil action negligence per se on the part of both drivers. The act of one is the act of both.

As expressed by the North Carolina Supreme Court, "Those who participate are on a joint venture and are encouraging and inciting each other. The primary negligence involved is the race itself. All who willfully participate in speed competition between motor vehicles on a public highway are jointly and concurrently negligent and, if damage to one not involved in the race prox-
