

Indian Fair Is Scheduled

Since its beginning in 1914 the Cherokee Indian fair has entertained thousands of visitors both Indian and non-Indian. In the beginning the fair was purely agricultural. As it gained in popularity it became the annual homecoming for the Eastern Band of Cherokee and the opportunity to exhibit Indian crafts for which the Cherokees are noted.

In 1963 the Cherokee Indian fair was brought to a close. Rules, regulations and laws related to livestock exhibitions forced the Eastern Band of Cherokee to give up their yearly celebration, to the disappointment of tribal members and their many friends.

After four long years 1963-1964 the Eastern Band of Cherokee were unable to gather the great clans in the fall of the year for their reunion with tribal members and their guests from all parts of the country.

In the fall of 1969 a volunteer group of the Eastern Band of Cherokee met to make plans to revive the historical gathering of the clans. It was decided at this meeting to rename the fair the Cherokee Indian Fall Festival and to make it bigger and better than ever.

Since 1969 the festival has become popular with not only local residents but visitors from as far as the states of New Mexico, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Louisiana, New York, Mississippi, Louisiana, Georgia, Arizona and Tennessee. It is no longer a gathering of the Cherokee clans alone as guests from the Apache tribes, Zuni, Navajo, Hopi, Seminole

Cherokee, Lumbee, Seneca, Micouchee, and Chitamacha have joined their brothers in giving thanks for a prosperous year and a good harvest.

The traditional dress of the various tribes attending the festival is most colorful during the nightly pow wow and the authentic Indian dances.

Indian sports will highlight this year's festival such as Indian stick ball, blow gun and archery contest, and Indian wrestling each afternoon.

The beauty contest which will be held at 7 p. m. October 2nd is a pageant well worth attending. Lovely Indian maidens, dressed as their ancestors compete in all phases of a Miss America contest. Miss Indian America, a Pageant from Arizona, will reign over the beauty pageant as well as other Indian activities.

Agricultural and homemaking exhibits will, this year, as always play a very important role during the festival. The arts and crafts exhibits displayed by local artists and the schools are expected to top any show to date. The visiting tribes exhibit their handcrafts and its most interesting to observe the similarity in art form between the various Indian tribes, yet a totally different way of expression. All Indian art is beautiful and a delight to see. Many arts and crafts will be on sale from October 2nd through October 6th.

Each evening during the festival, clog and square dances will be featured except the evening of October 2nd.

There will be games, rides and shows for all ages every day and every evening throughout the festival.

On Saturday afternoon October 6th following the 1 o'clock Indian stick ball game the Ocean

front Job Corps center will challenge the Great Onyx Ken-tucky job corps center in football. Both teams are rated tops in the conference.

The five day festival will commence with a parade second to none at 3 p. m. October 2nd. Starting at Frontierland on highway 19 and proceeding to the festival grounds on highway 441 will be bands, floats, marching units, wagon trains, drum and bugle corps, mounted riders, scouts, Indians, beauty contestants, and Miss Indian America.

The 1973 festival promises to be the best ever and all this activity for only \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for children to include all grandstand activities from morning till night.

N. C. Minimum Wage Will Advance To \$1.80 Per Hour On September 2

RALEIGH — The North Carolina minimum wage will advance to \$1.80 per hour for all covered employees on Sunday, September 2, 1973.

This increase from the previous \$1.60 hourly State minimum comes as the result of action completed by the N. C. General Assembly last May. Some 50,000 of the State's lowest paid citizens will benefit from the twelve and one-half per cent hike in the Tar Heel wage floor.

WHO IS COVERED
The North Carolina minimum applies to most nonfarm and non-governmental full-time employees in establishments employing four or more employees. Virtually all of the State's 775,000 factory workers will be covered by the \$1.80 State minimum. Normally, the chief wage protection of workers in manufacturing is the Federal Wage and Hour Law; but until final action is taken in Washington to raise the present \$1.60 Federal minimum to higher levels, most Tar Heel factory workers in establishments employing four or more employees will be covered by the

do not meet the law's definition of an "employer".

NO OTHER CHANGE IN LAW

No other changes were made in the Minimum Wage Law by the 1973 General Assembly. All of the former exceptions still remain in effect and coverage of the law is still the same.

Principal exemptions from the law include farm workers, domestic workers employed in private homes, persons 65 years of age or older, minors under 16 years of age, and employees working in establishments having less than four employees.

Unlike the Federal law in its application to retail and service businesses, the North Carolina law's coverage of these establishments does not depend upon their doing a certain annual dollar volume of business, but is determined simply by the number of workers which they employ. If they employ four or more non-exempt workers, they are covered by the State minimum wage.

Gasoline Pumps Required To Post Price Ceilings

GREENSBORO — All retailers of gasoline and No. 2-D diesel fuel will be required to post on each pump the ceiling price for gasoline or diesel fuel by September 1, 1973, under Phase IV regulations governing petroleum pricing. JRS Director Robert L. LeBaube pointed out today that gasoline retailers also will be required to post on each pump the minimum octane number of the gasoline.

"The U. S. Postal Service," LeBaube said, "will serve as the distribution channel for authorized stickers which will be used in the posting process."
The Council's Phase IV petroleum regulations are designed to balance the need to constrain price advances and the necessity to encourage increased supplies to meet the nation's energy demands. Petroleum prices will be permitted to rise to only that degree which would stimulate development of new energy reserves and permit the purchase of higher-cost foreign oil. At the same time, the regulations should in-

hibit unnecessary price increases." The Phase IV petroleum regulations were issued on August 17, 1973, and became effective 11:59 p. m. EST on August 19, 1973.
