The gain from the Columbia Cement sale, and the extraordinary gain of \$2.3 million from the previously announced sale of PPG's fiber glass insulation assets to Certain-teed Products Corp., which was included in PPG's second quarter figure, boosted total earnings for the first nine months of 1973 to \$80.7

Sales for the first nine months of 1973 equalled \$1.13 billion, compared with \$1.03 billion in

Income taxes for the third quarter and first nine months of 1973 were \$13.1 million and \$43 million, respectively. Comparable figures for 1972 were \$10.5 million and \$32.8 million.

Robinson F. Barker, PPG chairman and chief executive officer, gaid the company's outstanding performance was achieved despite a drag on pre-tax earning of about \$21.5 million during the first nine months by the company's chemical complex in Puerto Rico.

He said, however, that the situation has shown significant improvement in recent weeks be supply of reliability of electrical power, a shortage of which had been preventing steady opera-tions. Barker said the power turnaround occurred too late to have an impact on third quarter operations, but that the increased availability of power should re sult in the improvement in Puerto Rico operations in the fourth quarter and in 1974.

The PPG chief executive said all signs point to continuing strength in the company's main lines of business-glass, chemi-cals, coating and resins and fiber glass. He repeated that 1973 should be the company's third straight record year.
