Here's Where You Vote On Tuesday

Most citizens of the City of Kings Mountain will vote at two places Tuesday, in settling the run-off for Ward 3 city commissioner between Corbet Nicholson, the challenger who led in the first election, and Commissioner T. J. (Tommy) Ellison, who called for the runoff. Citizens of Wards I and V won't have to make but one stop to participate both in the city run-off, Kings Mountain school district, and state referenda elections, as both city and county voting will be conducted there. Citizens of Wards II, III, IV, and VI, however, will be required to make poll visits to two different places, if they are to participate in all the elections. For the state referenda voting, along with the school district contest between Alex Owens and Tracy M. (Mack) Stewart, Jr., East Kings Mountain residents will vote at City Hall, while West Kings Mountain citizens will vote at the Armory. State ballot and school district voting will also be conducted at Bethware school and the Grover fire station. Polling places for the "one-stop" city voters are Ward I, City Hall; Ward V, Armory. Polling places for the "two-stop" city voters are Ward II, American Legion; Ward III, East school; Ward IV, First Wesleyan Methodist Fellowship Hall; Ward VI, Kings Mountain high school.
