



work on the project since only two of the four bids received were eligible to be read. Two of the bids were unsigned, said Johnson.

Second and third low bidders for Section 1 were Hickory Con-struction Co., \$551,700.60 and C. W. Gallant, Inc. of Charlotte, \$575,785.50.

Second and third low bidden for Section II were Shott Hart man Construction Co. of Clemmons, N. C., \$196,526.50 and Terry Construction, Inc. of Green nille, S. C., \$197,038.05.

Mr. Johnson said the low bids re within the project estimate. Specifications call for doubl ing to four million gallons daily capacity of the Potts Creek treat ment plant, a pump station and line extension to divert a halfmillion gallon daily effluent from the McGill Creek plant, and other line-laying.

The project will be paid for by a federal grant of \$477,130, a state grant of \$159,045, and by the City of Kings Mountain, \$132,235. The city will finance its

share by issuing \$110,000 in bonds, with the balance coming from federal revenue - sharing


