Funeral services for Mrs. Vertie Butler Kale, 74, will be held Friday afternoon at 3:30 at the First Church of the Nazarene.

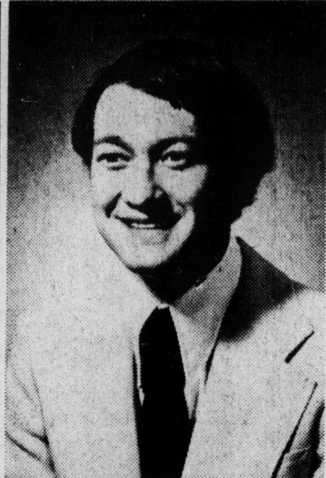
Mrs. Kale died Wednesday morning at 7 o'clock at Kings Mountain hospital. She had been ill seven years.

Lennon Named To ECU Post

Richard S. Lennon Jr. Kings Mountain native, who worked with NASA computer operations in support of the first man-on-the-moon mission, has been appointed acting director of the East Carolina University Computing Center at Greenville.

Lennon, 32, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Lennon, of 401 Neisler Drive joined the ECU Computing Center staff in November, 1972, as Manager of Programming and Systems.

Dr. C. Q. Brown, ECU Director of Institutional Development, said, "Mr. Lennon by his outstanding performance during the past year as the programming and systems manager for the computing center, has earned the confidence which this appointment reflects. I feel we are extremely fortunate to be able to draw on talent within our organization for such a vital role."

Lennon pledged that "it is our intention to work toward greatly expanding support that is provided to the academic community" through the computing center.

Born in Raleigh, Lennon finished high school in Kings Mountain, and attended Oak Ridge Military Institute, Oak Ridge. He earned the B. S. degree in Physics from the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill in 1964 and began work with NASA at the Kennedy Space Center, Cape Canaveral, Fla. While with NASA, Lennon participated in tracking and data processing operations in support of Gemini and Apollo missions, including the first orbital rendezvous by Gemini 76, the first manned lunar voyage by Apollo 8 and the first manned lunar landing by Apollo 11.

Upon successfully completing comprehensive examinations for a professional certificate in Data Processing, he earned the degree of Master of Business Administration from Stetson University in June, 1972.

Lennon is married to the former Sue Denney of Pawnee, Oklahoma, and New York City, and have two children.

work on the project since only two of the four bids received were eligible to be read. Two of the bids were unsigned, said Johnson.

Second and third low bidders for Section 1 were Hickory Construction Co., \$551,700.60 and C. W. Gallant, Inc. of Charlotte, \$575,785.50.

Second and third low bidders for Section II were Shott Hartman Construction Co. of Clemmons, N. C., \$196,526.50 and Terry Construction, Inc. of Greenville, S. C., \$197,038.05.

Mr. Johnson said the low bids are within the project estimate. Specifications call for doubling to four million gallons daily capacity of the Potts Creek treatment plant, a pump station and line extension to divert a half-million gallons daily effluent from the McGill Creek plant, and other line-laying.

The project will be paid for by a federal grant of \$477,130, a state grant of \$159,045, and by the City of Kings Mountain, \$132,235. The city will finance its share by issuing \$110,000 in bonds, with the balance coming from federal revenue-sharing funds.
