As a local government employee, Bloxam has served as director of utilities for Bennettsville, S. C. During his administration, Greenville was the first Tar Heel city to implement urban renewal and the first municipality in the state to complete a long range thoroughfare plan that received the approval of the N. His activities there include working as consultant to counties, cities and towns concerning inter-city highway-street facilities, drainage, water, sanitary sewer and long range reports and studies, assisting governmental units with federal and state funding programs and awards of contracts for new construction.

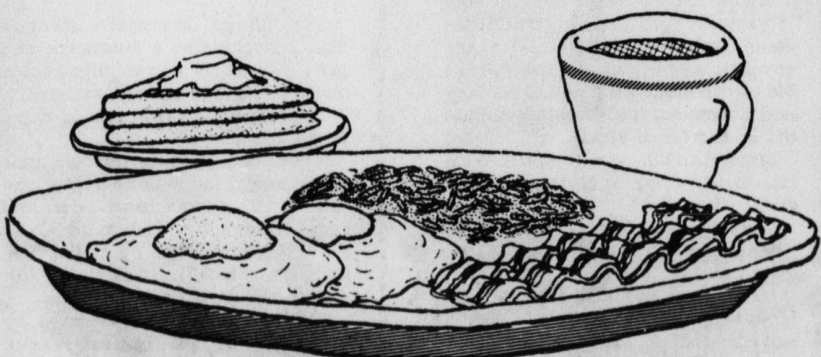
