Tough Standards Policy Set

requirements. In this test the applicant must also score on the high side.

The agility test, not in state requirements, will determine normal strength, ability and coordination. Applicants must score a minimum of 250 points conducting such exercises as sit-ups, squatthrust, pullups, pushups and a onemile run. Time limits are placed on each exercise and the number of each exercise completed scored.

For instance, under a two-minute limit an applicant will score 100 points by completing 60 sit-ups; 100 points for completing 15 pullups in one and a half minutes; 100 points for completing a one-mile run in ven minutes or under.

Applicants will further be subjected to a thorough background investigation; moral character; employment and criminal, the same as the state standards, but the city goes further with checks into military records, all local police files, police files in other cities where applicant may have lived or worked, state department granting driver's license, present and past neighbors and landlords, fraternal and social organizations and credit records.

Unlike state standards, local applicants must submit to a polygraph (lie detector) test and an oral

The latter, Chief Lloyd suggested, be conducted by a board consisting of no more than five persons including the police chief, commander officers of nearby police agencies and citizens with special qualifications in personnel administration from business and industry.

Next is a medical examination, then, if the applicant is approved, a one year probation period will be required.

Chief Lloyd said the new minimum requirements policy adopted Monday night is "tough, but necessary to bring high quality police officer material into the department."




