Thanks to Kings Mountain Baptist Church Citizens on Patrol and Emergency (COPE) and the Kings Mountain Crime Prevention program will move into the rock building owned by the church immediately.

All items marked for identification will be placed in an inventory book that citizens will be given.

Operation Identification is free and all citizens are urged to participate. Proper identification clearly marked on valuables cut down on the chances of them being stolen.

"That would get us started by mid November," Carver said, "which would put us into early spring for completion, just in time for the prime paving season."

Holmes said over 100 parcels of property have been purchased in the 111-acre project since it began, but there are other parcels to be acquired.

"This city will see considerable activity in the Cansler St. project this year," Holmes said. "We expect to see construction of curbing and guttering and storm drains and some electrical work."

Holmes said the work should be concentrated in key areas, such as

widening Waterson St., curbing and guttering, purchase of certain parcels by the redevelopment commission and the regrading of about 50 lots suited for single family dwellings.

The planner stressed the importance of work on the public area, which includes closing off Tracy St. between Parker and Ellis Sts. This street currently crossing the public recreational area, which will be developed with picnic areas, bike trails and possibly tennis, volleyball and basketball courts.

Holmes also presented a sketch of an idea how traffic can be routed toward the by-pass or northern parkway to give the city a north-south as well as an east-west traffic

pattern.

His sketch, which will be studied by the board, also includes a plan for the city acquiring "fragmentary parcels" along the by-pass route to be incorporated into the Cansler St. project plans.

Following the up-date discussion the board of commissioners adopted resolution permitting advertising for bids on materials for sanitary sewer, storm drains and street lighting construction. Also for electrical and gas department materials to be used in the Cansler St. project.

City employees will handle the majority of the construction work with a few minor items being contracted to outside firms.
