The Cleveland County Association For Retarded Children works relentlessly with our young who will never have the same advantages in life as their peers. Although these youngsters can never perform at what is called the normal pace, they are taught to perform at peak capacity on an individual basis. United Fund donations help keep their programs functioning.

The county's drug abuse prevention center also needs our United Fund dollars to keep a continuing education program alive that will save the lives of countless human beings in the months and years to come.

And there is the vital work of the American Red Cross, the Salvation Army and the charitable programs of the Kings Mountain Ministerial Association. All of

duel ended life of former Governor

Richard Dobbs Speight Sr. was the only man to serve as Governor of North Carolina who was later killed in a duel.

He was also the senior half of the only father-son learn to serve as Governor until the election of W. Kerr Scott's son, Robert, in 1968. Speight's son, R. D. Speight Jr., was elected Governor in 1885.

Speight Sr. served as chief executive in

He died in New Bern on the morning of september 6, 1802, from a bullet wound he had received the day before during a duel. Speight's opponent in the duel was John Stanley, his successor in Congress.

The two men were bitter political rivals. Stanley accused Speight of avoiding taking sides in important political issues. Speight responded heatedly and Stanley challenged him to a duel.

The duel was of an unusual nature. Considered at the time to be the honorable and gentlemanly way of settling a dispute, a pistol duel rarely ever went beyond two exchanges of fire. But Stanley and Speight were such bitter enemies they excha shots four times. On the fourth volley Speight was mortally wounded.

Speight had been one of North Carolina's most outstanding figures of public note. He signed the U.S. Constitution as one of North Carolina's delegates and was the first native born Governor of the state

Following Speight's death the Legislature passed even stronger anti-dueling statutes. Stanley was never charged, tried or convicted in Speight's death. He was pardoned by Governor Benjamin Williams and was later elected to Congress.



On September 5, 1928, Brig. Gen. Billy Mitchell of the U. S. Army Air Service changed the course of military history by sinking an obselete battleship off the North Carolina coast. Gen. Mitchell, who later accurately foretold that the next war (World War Two) would begin as an air war with the Japanese bombing Pearl Harbor during his courtmartial only a couple of years later, sank the ship by dropping bombs from his

His demonstration, before a largely hostile roup of American naval and military commanders, is regarded as the real birth of modern air power.

His planes took off from a field on the Outer Banks in Dare County to demonstrate the bombing technique.

Edward Hyde was the first Governor of the separate territory of North Carolina following the division of the two Carolinas in 1711.

A cousin of Queen Anne of England, Hyde, with the title of Earl of Clarendon, was one of the only two members of nobility to serve as Governor of the state. His brief term was marred by Indian uprisings and internal

Hyde County was named in his honor. He died of yellow fever in Bertle County September 8, 1712

On September 5, 1875, a Constitutional Congress was held in Raleigh and 30

amendments to the Constitution of 1865 were The state's present Constitution was

written and adopted in 1868. It had been sponsored by the state's new Republican Party during the bitter Reconstruction Period, however, and when the Democrat Party regained control in the 1870's they rushed to make wholesale changes in the machinery of government. Republicans charged that it was largely a power play with the Legislature assuming controls that had formerly rested with county governments. In many areas, as in the mountain counties, local government was controlled by the GOP. Republican leaders said the desale passage of amendments to the State Constitution was done to deny them

Even today, a century later, the North Carolina State Legislature retains greater control over local affairs than is the case in

On September 6, 1875, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill reopened its doors. The university had been forced to cease operation in 1868 during the aftermath of The Civil War.
