Kings Mountain High's defense recorded its fourth straight shutout and the offense had its most consistent performance of the season Friday night at John Gamble Stadium as the Mountaineers rolled to their most lop-sided victory in 21 years, a 50-0 romp over Bessemer City. The 50 point spread represents the biggest victory point-wise for the Mountaineers since 1955, when KMHS opened its season with a 59-0 waltz past Bessemer City. and Ellis added his second straight PAT. Kenny Bell, KM's leading rusher but a nonscorer Friday, was the game's top rusher with 88



The Baby Lions bring a perfect 3-0 record into the contest against Coach Bud Bumgardner's Little Mountaineers.


