

'Farmers For Carter' Formed In KM

"The first and foremost agricultural concern of Jimmy Carter, Democratic candidate for President, is that agricultural productivity be used to benefit the farmers and consumers in the United States."

Clyde Randall, Bethlehem community dairy farmer, made this statement in announcing the formation of a "Farmers for Carter" committee in Cleveland County. Other members include Jim Yarbrow, Bethlehem community poultry producer, Bill Plonk, Kings

Mountain dairyman, David Beam, Fallston poultry producer, Eddie Harrill, Lattimore cattleman, Jack Harmon Midway community cattleman, Daniel Lattimore, Polkville apple grower, Everett Lutz, Belwood apple grower, and Cameron Ware, Bethware community peach and apple grower.

According to Randall, Jimmy Carter is a farmer and Carter says, "Farmers don't want a guaranteed profit, but they want a fair shake." Randall said Carter believes as farmers

do that the family farm is the cornerstone of agriculture in this country. Jimmy Carter will introduce and support legislation that will enhance farming as a profession and encourage farmers and their children to continue producing food and fiber for this country.

Carter says, "Our city people are natural partners with those of us in rural America. What is best for the family farmer in the long run is exactly what is best for the con-

The GOP offers a full slate, 10 candidates for Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, State Auditor, Attorney General, Commissioners of Agriculture, Insurance and Labor and Supt. of Public Instruction. In order the candidates are David T. Flaherty, William S. Hlatt, Asa T. Spaulding Jr., J. Howard Coble, Michael A. Godfrey, Edward L. Powell, Kenneth H. Roberson, Edwin Tenney, T. Avery Nye Jr. and Evelyn S. Tyler.

In the same races the Democrats offer a full slate. In the same order as above, the candidates are James B. (Jim) Hunt Jr., James C. (Jimmy) Green, Thad Eure, Harlan Boyles, Henry L. Bridges, Rufus Edmisten, James A. Graham, John Ingram, John Brooks and Craig Phillips.

On the Presidential ballot 10 candidates are listed among five political parties. The Democratic slate includes Jimmy Carter and Walter Mondale; the Republican slate is Gerald R. Ford and Robert Dole; The American Party —

Thomas J. Anderson and Rufus Shackelford; The Labor Party — Lyndon H. LaRouche Jr.; and The Libertarian Party — Roger MacBride and David Bergland.

The Democratic candidates in the County and District Officers races include Lewis Bulwinkle, Berlin H. Carpenter Jr., Arnold Max Harris, Ralph Phillips and Donald E. Ramseur seeking 27th Judicial District judgeships. In the 28th District State Senate race are Ollie Harris, Helen Rhyne Marvin and Marshall A. Rauch. In the 40th District State House race are Robert Z. Falls, Robert A. Jones and Edith Ledford Lutz.

All are without opposition and will automatically be elected next Tuesday.

The polls will be open from 6:30 a. m. until 7:30 p. m. Tues., Nov. 2 and a large turnout is expected. According to new registration figures supplied by the Cleveland County Elections Board there are 31,073 eligible voters in the county. Broken down there are 25,208 Democrats; 4,585 Republicans and 89 American Party members. The female voter registration still is greater than the male rolls — 16,149 to 14,924.

East Kings Mountain precinct has 1,911 registered voters, West KM has 3,103 registered, Grover — 620, and Bethware — 946.

East KM precinct voters will go to the community center gymnasium to cast ballots next Tuesday, instead of the Mountaineer Room on the lower level due to the large turnout expected.

West KM voters will continue voting at the armory and Bethware voters at Bethware School on the Shelby Highway.

The Kings Mountain Kiwanis Club is offering free rides to the polls next Tuesday between 9:30 a. m. and 4:30 p. m.

Frank Van Storey of the Kiwanis Club said that eligible voters without transportation may call 739-5403 (Frederickson Motor Express) and ask for "Voter transportation. Members of the club will pick voters up, take them to the polls and return them to the points of pick up.

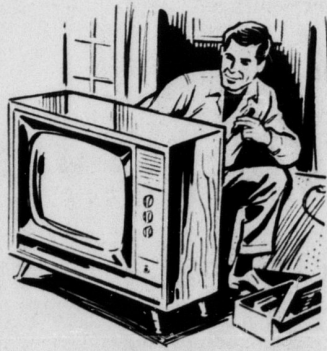
