Legion Dance Set

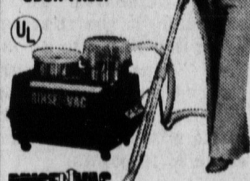
American Legion Post 155 has booked Maurice Williams and The Zodiacs for a return engagement on Sat., Nov. 27.
