

with a .22 weapon, positively identified Bristol as his assailant. Tarpley was shot once in the corner of his left eye at the bridge of the nose and a second time in the back, beneath the right shoulder blade. Rayfield had also been killed by a

Police Chief Earl Lloyd said he ordered the investigation into Rayfield's death reopened when he took office early in 1976 and called in

the SBI to assist. Agent Jim Woodward worked with Sgt. Richard Reynolds to complete the investigation, the results of which Reynolds turned over to District Attorney Hamp Childs. The DA okayed drawing the warrants for Bristol.

Bristol, who is still being held in the county jail, will be defended by the public defender office. He went through a probable cause hearing last Friday morning, then was assigned to a preliminary hearing set for Mon., Dec. 20 in Shelby. Following that the evidence will be turned over to the Grand Jury for indictment and a return of a true bill before the case will be assigned to the Cleveland Superior Court criminal calendar.

Sgt. Reynolds said the warrants served on Bristol for the murder and robbery of Rayfield came only after a "painstaking and thorough investigation."

R-96:

The commission is responsible for street work, curbing and gut-tering, sidewalks and engineering fees. The city is responsible for clearing and grubbing, excavation, storm drainage and support activities. The city is also responsible for installation and relocation of water, sewer and gas

lines. Southeastern Consultant Engineers has the job of updating the elecsystem. And Southern Bell will also have workmen in the area for phone service work.

"There are quite a few agencies, department heads and engineers involved in this project,"
White said, "So we have held two meetings, about nine hours work, to coordinate all of the activities in the R- 6 project. With a half a million dollar program at stake, we felt all parties should know exactly what the full story is, not just an individual's portion of the work.

'Now, everyone knows what problems everyone else faces in completing the project," he continued. It should turn out to be a well coordinated project."

White said the success of the program depends heavily on whether or not the city can meet its obligations. City employes have the hardest task of all the agencies working in the R-96 project; rerouting gas lines because of streets being closed off, installing water and sewer lines. All of these lines go underground and must be done first before the rest of the program can be put

into effect.
"The plan calls for Champion to move into an area as soon as the city's work is completed, remove the paving and preparing the road beds with about six inches of gravel,"
White said. "This will be done one section at a time so the entire project area will not be one muddy and

"We don't want to cause the residents in the R-96 area more inconvenience than is absolutely necessary while the program is being completed," he said.

The street paving program will not get underway until next spring, so motorists in the R-96

area will find themselves traveling over graveled roads and past barricades with flashing lights for awhile

White said the commission is making a plea to residents of the ares to help maintain some order as far as the barricades are concerned. "Some of the battery-powered flashers have been stolen already," he continued.
"At night, without these
barricades and flashing lights, there is a danger of an accident and serious injury to people. We are asking residents to cooperate in reporting such vandalism im-mediately. Public safety is
